Before making arrangements to vacate your present home, be sure that you have other accommodation and a permit to occupy it. Applications for permits should be addressed to the Administrator of Emergency Shelter in the area to which you plan to move.

Every person who rents or occupies family quarters in any of these districts contrary to the order, commits an offence and, in addition to other penalties, will be required to vacate the shelter and the district at his own expense.

Was Member of Society of Friends

In the death last Friday, August 3, of Harriet Frances Stephens, widow of Mordcai F. Starr, the community suffered the loss of a life-long resident and one highly esteemed.

She was born August 28, 1857, the daughter of Nelson Stephens and Emily Penrose, on lot 27, con. 3, Whitchurch township. On Dec. 19, 1877 she married Mordcai Starr who lived three-quarters of a mile north of her home. They lived in the same school section until the death of the latter in June, 1934. Afterwards she and their eldest daughter, Esther S. Hawtin, continued to live in the home built in 1919 on the opposite end of the same lot on which she was born.

Her parents were Anglican but shortly after her marriage, she adopted the faith of her husband and became a member of the Religious Society of Friends (Quaker). She was ever interested in work of Christian enterprise and moral reform; her speciality being primary class teaching in Sunday School. She taught for 30 years at Bogartown Sunday School. Two sons, Edgar and N. Elroy, predeceased her. She is survived by one son, Elmer, on the home farm, and three daughters, Mrs. R. R. Hawtin, at home; Mrs. J. A. Hawtin, Beaverton; Mrs. A. T. Cleaver, Simcoe, and 14 grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Ministers of three different denominations had part in the funeral service, Joseph Clayton, Norwich,

Harry Parry, Wellington, R. R. McMath, Pine Orchard and Newmarket, and Alvin Winger, Gormley.

The pall bearers were one son-in-law and five grandsons. Burial was in the family plot at Pine Orchard cemetery.
