**Tax Bills Now Issued**

During the past week ratepayers of Stouffville received their 1945 tax bills, the first instalment of which is due and payable now and not later than Sept. 1st, otherwise a penalty will be added. It will be noted with general satisfaction that the tax bills are down three mills. That means the man with a \$1,000 assessment will save \$9 on his total bill over that paid last year. This is good reading to the average citizen, since everybody likes low taxes. Unfortunately everybody likes first class service in the community, and the two are very hard to keep in balance.

It is not a good plan to leave the payment of your taxes too near the last day, since it causes a rush at the paying office. Persons who pay their second instalment of taxes due in Dec. with the first instalment now will receive a discount of two per cent. on the second instalment. Two-thirds of the tax payers took advantage of this discount last year.
