"Low average yields of potatoes in all Central Canada are due to the lack of use of certified disease-free seed, improper fertilizer, indifference toward the control of light blight, potato bugs, and other pests," says Dr. E. S. Archibald, Director, Dominion Experimental Farms Service. "Why choose to produce potatoes at the rate of only 80 to 90 bushels of commercial potatoes per acre when 320 bushels can be acquired with little extra cost per acre and infinitely less per bushel?" he asks.

**Tax Bills Now Issued**

During the past week, ratepayers of Stouffville received their 1945 tax bills, the first instalment of which is due and payable now and not later than Sept. 1st, otherwise a penalty will be added. It will be noted with general satisfaction that the tax bills are down three mills. That means the man with a \$1,000 assessment will save \$9 on his total bill over that paid last year. This is good reading to the average citizen, since everybody likes low taxes. Unfortunately everybody likes first class service in the community, and the two are very hard to keep in balance.

It is not a good plan to leave the payment of your taxes too near the last day, since it causes a rush at the paying office. Persons who pay their second instalment of taxes due in Dec. with the first instalment now will receive a discount of two per cent. on the second instalment. Two-thirds of the tax payers took advantage of this discount last year.

**CLAIMS WEEDS ARE WORST CROP THIEVES**

"Weeds are the greatest crop thieves in Canada," says Dr. E. S. Archibald, Director, Dominion Experimental Farms Service. "Inaction on the part of farmers, indifference on the part of municipalities, railroads and others are causing ever-increasing losses through weeds in crops and by increased costs of production among those farmers who are attempting control measures. Diligence and thoroughness are the only sure remedy," he says. "In cultural measures, the use of clean seed and the prevention of the introduction of still worse weeds for which there are no control measures, is urgent. Why take 20 per cent less crop of grains, hay, and pasture, and why use 50 per cent more labour on all the crops if adequate control measures by individuals in communities would save these?" he asks.
