### Barn Roof Hurlied Across the Road

Following an explosion which blew the roof off and deposited it in a field across the road, fire completely enveloped and destroyed the barn on the farm of Mr. Horace Webster, a half-mile south of Oakwood in the Lindsay district shortly before noon, Thursday last week. The fire was first noticed by the owner, but spread so rapidly that efforts to try and save the building were futile and neighbors who hurried to the scene concentrated on saving the other buildings on the premises. Despite this precaution a pigery near the barn was also consumed in the blaze. This was the second time that loss of a similar nature had been suffered by Mr. Webster. Some 23 years ago a large frame structure on the same site fell prey to fire under almost identical conditions. The building which was destroyed in Thursday's conflagration was steel-roofed structure, erected to replace the one formerly burned down. Despite the fact that some insurance on the barn was carried, the loss sustained is expected to be quite heavy. At the moment, while it is known that some livestock was burned, exactly what was lost is not certain. In the barn at the time was all the season's hay crop and a large quantity of grain which had just been threshed. Farm equipment known to have been destroyed included a new milking machine and separator. The shock proved too much for the owner who has not been in good health for some months and he suffered a heart-seizure. Latest reports say that he is somewhat improved.
