DENTAL SURVEY OF PICKERING

The Medical Officer of Health for Pickering Township, Dr. N. F. Tomlinson has arranged through the Public Health Committee of the Ontario Dental Association that a Dental Survey will be made of all the school children in Pickering Township. The Survey to be made the 24th of September, 1945. This Survey is made through the kind co-operation of six local dentists; at no cost to the Township of Pickering.

It is indicated in Ottawa that it was for the gasoline companies themselves to decide whether prices should be reduced or not so that the Wartime Prices and Trade Board is merely concerned to enforce the ceiling prices. The Governor-General and Princess Alice intend to return to Britain for a visit, though his successor Field Marshal Sir Alexander, will not come here until next spring, with the Earl of Athlone's term of office having nearly ended on June 21, 1945, though it has been extended beyond the original five-year term. In the past, Canada used to send large numbers of horses to other countries, including shipments to Great Britain, South Africa, the Soviet Russian Union, and so forth. Now, a start in this direction is being made again and it has become known in Ottawa that Canada is shipping horses abroad to France and Holland, including a contract for 5000 horses to the last mentioned destinations alone. The Wool Board Limited, a Crown company associated with the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, created in 1942, has told Canadian wool producers that it will continue its purchases until the end of December, 1946. This organization was established to encourage wool production by a stable market at known prices in Canada.

BYRON A. ROBERTSON

Associated with Christie Brown & Co., Ltd. for 37 years, Byron Alexander Robertson, 76, of Victoria Square, died on Monday, Sept. 3rd, at the Toronto General Hospital.

Born at Belleville, Mr. Robertson engaged for a time in school teaching, later moving to Detroit, where he was connected for a few years with the printing trade. He returned to Canada and joined the staff of Christie Brown & Co., Ltd., retiring nine years ago.
