## W.P.T.B. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q.—Will we receive special coupons when meat rationing starts?  
A.—No, your present ration book contains two pages of coupons marked "M" those will be used for the purchase of meat when rationing goes into effect.

Q.—How long will the rationing sugar coupons remain valid?  
A.—Coupons for rationing sugar will remain valid for some time yet, but last year they remained valid until the end of December, while we have no definite information as yet they will likely be good until the end of 1945. In any case, a W.P.T.B. announcement will be made in advance.

Q.—I paid a deposit on the rent of some unfurnished rooms. Three days later circumstances arose which prevented me from taking the rooms. Can I claim the return of deposit or part of it?  
A.—Rentals regulations do not cover such situations as this when you put a deposit on rooms it is with the idea of holding them until you are able to move in, of course, in the meantime the landlord is prevented from renting to anyone else. The deposit is actually paid to the landlord for the privilege of holding the accommodation, as he kept his part of the bargain, it is unlikely you would have any legal claim for return of deposit.

Q.—Since we no longer require materials for the making of uniforms for service people why do we hear so much about shortages of materials particularly for men's suits and shirts?  
A.—It is quite true that there has been a great reduction in the amount of material required for

100 Holsteins Comprise Second Shipment To Mexico Official

A second shipment of 100 head of Holstein cattle from Lindsay district left Friday night in eight cars on their long rail journey to Mexico. The cattle were shipped to the order of the Secretary to the President of Mexico, Lic. J. Jesus Gonzalez Galo, La Paz, Guadalajara, Mexico.

The herd was selected by Dr. Sanchez, General G. L. Escobar, of Mexico and Mr. W. D. Davis, of the Dominion Department of Agriculture. The cattle were purchased from Murco Farms owned by Mr. Murphy owner of Claremont's Lloydbrook Farm and it was the second time in recent months that they had figured in an important cattle transfer with Mexico. They were accompanied by Jack Brown, local farm manager.
