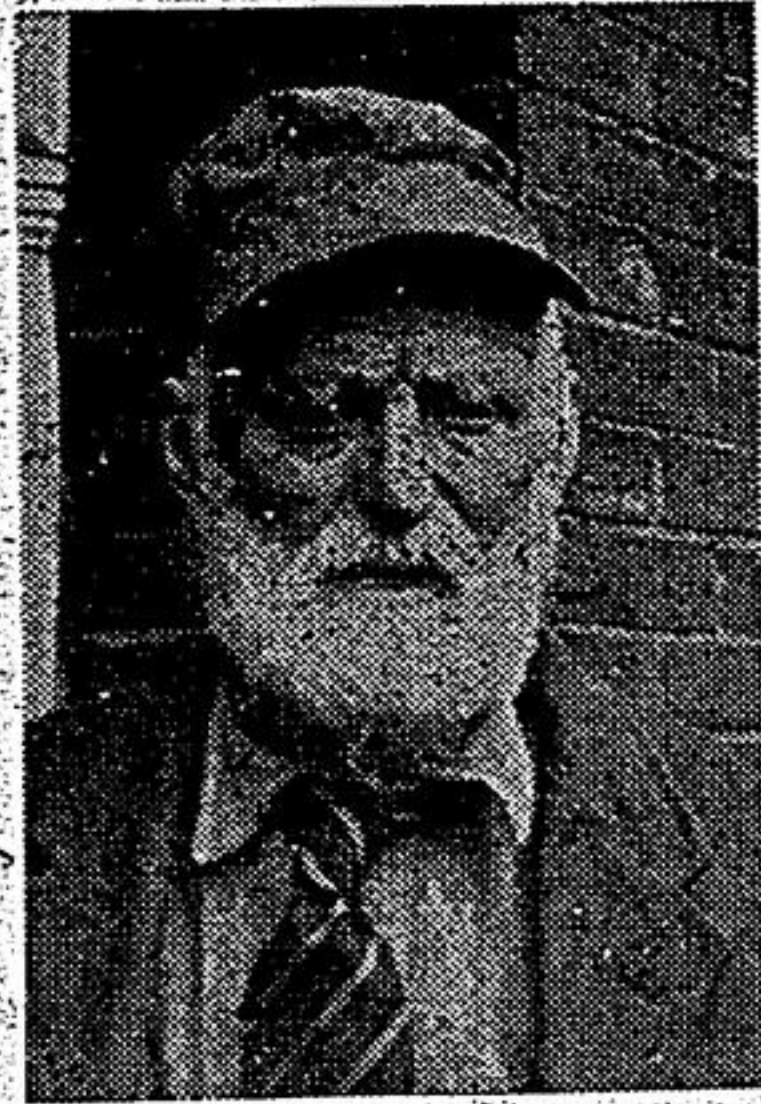

Job Jordan One of Popular Old Lady Oldest Men in Whitchurch Twp.

One of the oldest men in this neighborhood, Mr. Job Jordan of Ballantrae, died on Sunday, Sept. 9th, 1945, at an advanced age in his 93rd year. He was a native of Whitchurch township, being born



in Stouffville. Although a resident of town 42 years Mrs. Mowat, like her husband who predeceased her five years, lived her entire life in the environs of the town. She was born at Almira in Markham township, a daughter of Christopher and Sarah Hare. Jemima Hare and James Mowat were married some 60 years ago and spent their long life together living in Markham and for years at Glasgow. When they came to town Mr. Mowat later was made caretaker of the school building, a position he held for years, or until age caused his retirement. Born to them were three sons, Magnus of Lindsay, Oille of Scarborough Junction, and Bruce who died ten years ago. Mrs. Mowat was of a family of nine, four of whom survive her three sisters, Mrs. McNeely and Mrs. E. Mannah of Toronto, Mrs. G. M. Richardson of Markham, and one brother Wm. S. Hare of Temperanceville.

Mrs. Mowat was outstanding in her devotion to the church, first the Presbyterian and later the United. She was also keenly interested in Liberalism, and never failed to cast her ballot on election day. She read a great deal and was well informed.

The funeral on Tuesday afternoon from the late home proceeded to Stouffville cemetery. Her pastor Rev. D. Davis officiated at the service.

Nobody ever lived in Stouffville without becoming acquainted with Mrs. James Mowat, a lady who possessed the quality of friendship in an unusual way. On Sunday, this kindly and friendly woman passed away in her 93rd year, following a long period of ill health; the past month or two of which she was nursed at the Brierbush Hospital in Stouffville.

Drops Dead Standing in Doorway of his Home

Standing in the doorway of his home at 116 Shaftsbury avenue, Toronto, on Sunday afternoon, Sept. 9, William M. McKinnon, formerly of Stouffville, dropped dead without the slightest warning. Only an hour before he had called his mother in Stouffville by telephone, and intimated that he would be out shortly for his car which was being repaired in town. Death was due to a thrombosis.

William McKinnon was the only son of the late John McKinnon and Mrs. McKinnon of Stouffville. He was born 60 years ago north of this town, and spent most of his life in the district. He is survived by his wife Vera and one son six years of age, also by his mother in the old home on Montreal street, and by one sister, Mrs. W. A. Taylor, Toronto.

The deceased was in town only a few days before his death, and was working a portion of the old home property in the east end of the town. His sudden death is a great shock. The remains were brought to Stouffville on Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 12. Service was held at the home of his mother.
