New Bridges in Uxbridge Township

The Uxbridge Township Council met for its regular monthly meeting on the evening of Sept. 10, at eight o'clock.

The principal activity in which the township has been engaged during the past month was the construction of two bridges, one on the third concession line over White's creek, and one on the North Township line, north east of the town of Uxbridge. Owing to the nature of the creek bed at both locations the District Engineer recommended that wooden bridges be built, supported on piles driven into the bed of the creeks. The road superintendent reported that, excepting for some fill, he had the bridges completed. Both of these bridges are such that the Department of Highways will pay 75% of the cost of construction.

The council decided to take initial steps towards procuring a complete list of names of persons belonging to the municipality who have served in the armed forces during the war just ended.

The council passed road account No. 8 amounting to \$3423.30 for payment, also general accounts to the amount of \$541.21.

The next meeting will be held on October 8th at 8 o'clock in the evening.
