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## Pickering Reeve Suffers Bad Fall During Threshing

Blake Annis, Reeve of Pickering Township, received head injuries for the second time, in six weeks while assisting in threshing operations at Whitevale Thursday, but



once again he got off rather lightly. Attendants at Toronto East General Hospital reported his hurts to be minor and his condition good.

Mr. Annis returned to his home on Sunday, but is still unable to move his head, and may have to return to the hospital for further x-rays if the pain continues.

In his last tumble, he drove up with a load of grain to the threshing machine on the farm of Harry White at Whitevale and was on top of the load when one of his horses got its tail caught in the machine's drive belt. The team bolted and threw the reeve to the ground on his head.

About six weeks ago he was unloading hay in his own barn when the trip rope broke. He was thrown off the load and fell about 20 feet through the hay chute to the stable floor. He escaped with slight injuries.
