OUR CAPITAL CORRESPONDENT

There is no more recruiting in the old fashioned manner for Canada's armed forces and this is raising the issue about the probable size or extent of this nation's army, navy and air force, with these future plans being very much in the mind of men both inside and outside Parliament, though departmental estimates in Parliament may settle the issue as defence ministers reveal their needs. However, it is little doubt now that Canada's armed forces in the immediate future will not sink as low in numbers as in the pre-war days when there were only about 1700 in the navy at one time, 4500 in the army and less than 4,000 in the air force. Of course, the wartime size of Canada's armed forces will be diminished rapidly from its peak figures of over 90,000 for the navy, 480,000 for the army and over 200,000 for the air force, with the exact extent of such forces being dependent on the probable contribution of Canada to the world's police force of military power of the United Nations amongst other considerations.

Canada as result of the end of the war, inquiries in Ottawa have emphasized that there is an earnest intention on the part of the authorities in this capital to eliminate all possible regulations may not exist any longer than absolutely essential in the public interest. Indeed, it is claimed that Canada, in this respect, was better prepared for the sudden and unexpected end of the Pacific war than many other nations so that the free movement of labour was in a much better position in this country than in many others.

In face of the nation-wide publicity which has been given to plans of creating a very powerful radio station, complete with television and frequency modulation in Quebec, together with putting into practice the Quebec Radio Bureau Act as a purely new private radio station operating license has been issued by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, with the additional remark that legal questions are involved before any such plan can be carried out by any provincial authority. Indeed, there is a view that the "Quebec Radio Bureau Act," establishing a purely provincial radio system, may be beyond the jurisdiction of the Province of Quebec since in 1932 there was a ruling of the Privy Council in London, England, Canada's highest court in justice, that control of radio was entirely within the jurisdiction of the Federal Parliament in Ottawa.

SMALL ARMS AMMUNITION
 Due to the termination of the war in the Pacific, the WTPB has announced the end of Small Arms Ammunition rationing, effective Sept. 1st. With the hunting season approaching, this news will be welcome to persons who require ammunition for local hunting.

EXPECT STANDARD TIME BACK SEPT. 30, BUT NO RULING YET

No cabinet decision has been made regarding return of the Dominion to standard time, ministers said late last week. However, it seems to be taken for granted that Canada will abandon national daylight time at the same time as the U.S.

This may be Sept. 30, as reported by congressional leaders in Washington. If not, it will be some time close to that date. The matter is under consideration by the government and an announcement is expected soon.

Final decision as to the date will not be made until railways, other transportation services and U.S. authorities are fully consulted. Discussions have been under way for some time, so it is expected the date will be set within a few days.

There have not been many complaints to the department of agriculture from farmers, though it is accepted that they want return to standard time as soon as possible. The latest letter to Hon. J. G. Gardiner, protesting the present time status, demanded to know when the "funny time" would end. It came from a farmer in the Maritimes.

Daylight time for all Canada was adopted as a war measure. One of the main reasons was to save hydro-electric power for war factories. Power control officials have stepped out of the picture with tapering off of war production, and the matter is one of government policy.

The United States intends to set the clocks back an hour by Sept. 30 by having Congress abolish daylight saving time adopted in 1942, to provide more day time for war work.

Chairman Clarence Cannon (Dem., Mo.) said he does not expect "a single vote" against the action in either the Senate or House. Government officials say daylight time deprives millions of hours of sleep. It makes school children start for their studies in darkness, and has farm workers out in the fields before the dew is gone in the mornings. Further it contributes to an increase in juvenile delinquency, and increases absenteeism in factories.

CRIMES OF VIOLENCE SEEN ON INCREASE

"This list represents a disturbing increase in crimes of violence throughout Ontario," declared C.L. Snyder, deputy attorney general, last week, regarding the lists for the fall assizes throughout the province, which will open next week. There are 18 murder cases, one attempted murder, 25 manslaughter cases and 18 charges of serious offences against women.



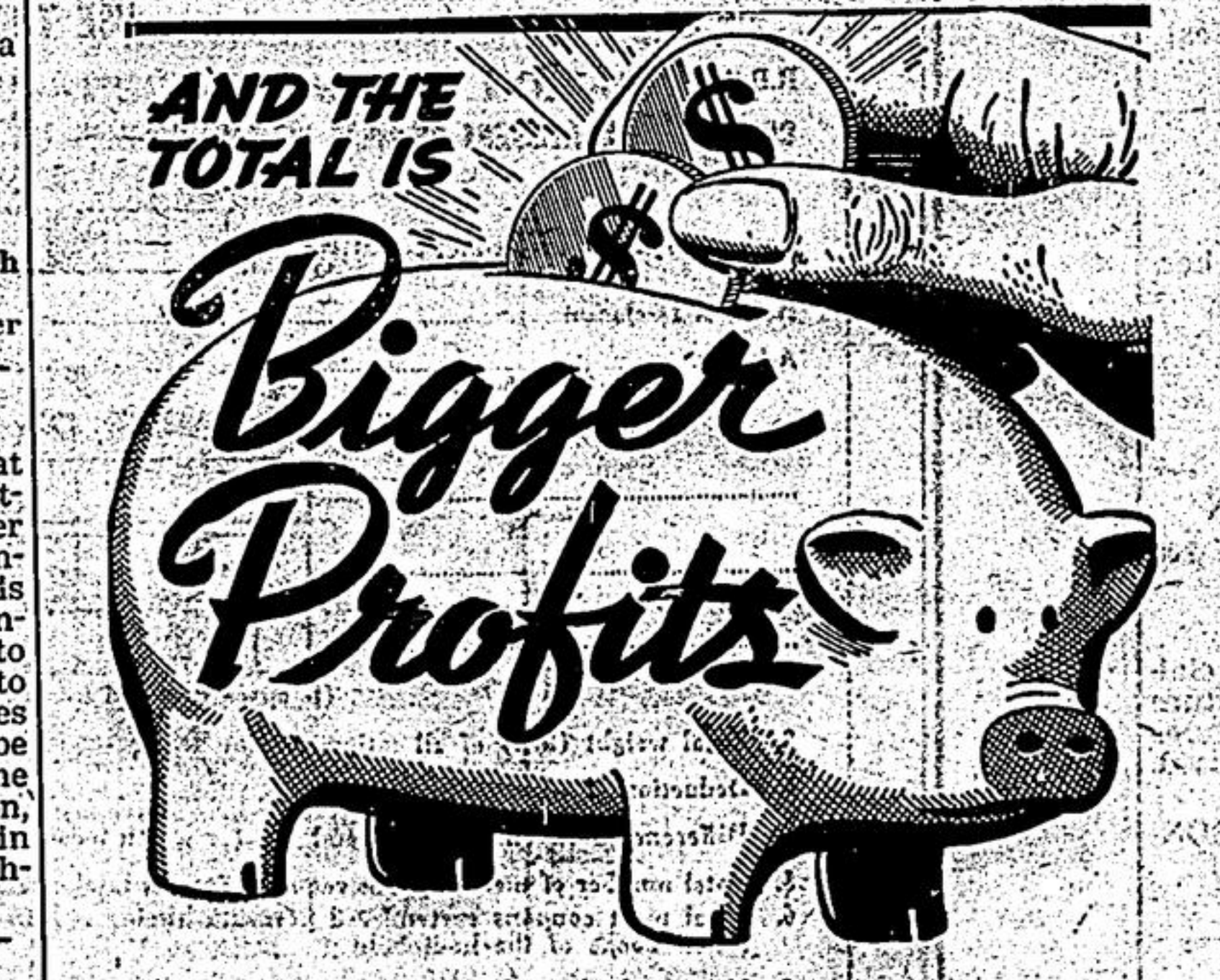
