Half a Century Thresher, W. Whittleton is Dead

Few men were more widely known in his locality than William Whittleton, who operated a threshing outfit in Uxbridge Township for 50 years. He died at the home of his cousin Samuel Whittleton south of Goodwood on Wednesday evening, Oct. 17, 1945, in his 90th year. Hard working, industrious and greatly respected he enjoyed a wide patronage, and at the time he retired from active business about five years ago he had two outfits on the road. They were modern machines, as compared with the old horse-power outfit used in his early days.

The kind of man Mr. Whittleton was to work for can be judged by the fact that one of his employees, Warren Beach, was with him for nearly a quarter century. Mr. Beach has been threshing for 27 years.

William Whittleton was born on the 4th concession of Uxbridge on a farm just north of the C.N.R. crossing, a son of Samuel Whittleton and his wife Sarah King. His long life was all spent in and around Goodwood, thus he was probably the oldest living man to have been born in the locality. He married Mary Ann Watson who predeceased him in 1921. They had no family.

For the past two years Mr. Whittleton made his home with a cousin Samuel Whittleton at lot 12, Con. 3, and from here the funeral was held on Friday afternoon, the service being conducted by Rev. L. E. Atkinson of Uxbridge. Interment was made in the family plot at Goodwood cemetery.

SELDOM SEEN

If a person could live a couple of hundred years the change or method of life would be so revolutionized that I would find myself unable to keep up with the rapid changes, and would be quite outdated. When I think of all the improvements that have taken place in my short span, it is amazing. The other evening I went over to the neighbors and they were doing the milking. There the cows were being suckled dry by the mechanical process, and I thought it was quite good. To be honest, I was rather skeptical about the milking machine 15 years ago, but it has proven itself.

Even on a sand farm there are improvements too, and it is to enjoy some of these things that I would like to live for. I think one of the meanest jobs on the farm is digging post holes. It has to be done, but it is invariably postponed as often as possible. Even an experienced posthole digger who really puts his back into it, hasn't much to show for his work at the end of the day.

Fortunately, there is hope. A mechanical digger or drill is now on the market, and I learn that the first one to operate in Canada is digging holes at New Westminster for an electrical contractor.

A hole two feet across and six feet deep can be bored in three minutes, just about the time it takes me or the hired man when I have one, to spit on our hands and haul up one spoonful of reluctant earth. I hope that I will last long enough to get one of these new dingles out here to dig the holes for the line fence which has to be reset.
