**Nurse Suddenly Throws Up Job**

Quite unexpectedly the recently engaged nurse for Markham Township and village resigned the job and has left the district, with no arrangement whatever for the future carrying on of the work she started.

The two municipalities entered into an arrangement for a qualified nurse to do work among the school children, and considerable preliminary arrangement and expense were incurred in setting up the necessary files for the nurse. The work was encouraged by the Dept. of Health at Queens Park, who recommended, we understand, the young lady that was engaged.

Because she could not secure satisfactory transportation, so it is said, she handed in her resignation, and has left the district. Until a new appointment is made, everything will be at a stand still, but the situation is not by any means serious. The health of the communities is good, and the local Boards of Health are available to carry on certain preventive work in the schools if that becomes necessary.

**Mrs. A. S. Collins Buried Here Monday**

A good neighbor and one filled with sympathy for all good works, Mrs. Alfred S. Collins passed away suddenly on Friday as a result of a stroke while she was visiting at the home of one of her sons in Toronto. For some months now Mrs. Collins had been in declining health and was living with her daughter, Mrs. McCowan at Malvern on this account.

The funeral on Monday afternoon was from the Stouffville Christian Church to Stouffville cemetery, the last rites being performed by Rev. Chas. Montgomery. There was a large concourse of old friends and acquaintances at the church to participate in the service and an instrumental solo was played by Miss Nora Stapleton using one of Mrs. Collins' favorite hymns.

Born in Stouffville 79 years ago the former Margaret Davis was a daughter of Philip Davis, and on the eve of her 20th birthday she married John B. German whose occupation was blacksmithing. To them were born two sons and one daughter, namely, Messrs. Addison and Aussie German of Toronto, and Mrs. McCowan at Malvern. There are 7 grandchildren and one great grandchild surviving as well, and one brother, Albert Davis of Glasgow, age 83 years.

The passing of Mrs. Collins records the death of a second member of her original family within two months, since Mrs. Collins' other brother, Elijah Davis died in Lansing, Mich. at that time.

Mr. German died in 1912, and the widow then married Alfred S. Collins who survives his wife. The Collins' home in the east end was a favorite spot for scores of friends to gather, always being assured of a warm and sincere welcome. Mrs. Collins was also active in the women's work of the Christian Church in town, and possessed a good musical voice. As a girl she worked at the millinery business and her whole life in the community has been one of service.

**Power Shortage is Widespread**

Home owners who are petitioning for more street lamps on the outskirts of town, east and west, will have to depend on the moon for a while longer.
