North Against South' Resentment Growing in Pickering

South Pickering Ratepayers Association have been flooding the press for some time with a line of talk about the police protection in the township, which the farming element feels is quite adequate for their needs. No doubt if the southern members of the family feel more police should be put on the matter, can be arranged with the cost being born by those who are clamouring for the protection. Transient and summer residents who require more policing are not the responsibility of the farmers, so many think. Now the 8-hour day is being capitalized on as a reason for adding to the police force, but no brief is being filed or protest offered on behalf of the farmers who work 12 hours a day and several hours each Sunday.

There is a growing felling of resentment among many north township residents, whom have been questioned by this paper, against the continual "uproar" in the south, and not a few have voiced strong approval of the township division plan. Relief Cases from Ajax not Responsibility of Pickering

If a present resident of Pickering came to that municipality solely to work at the Ajax war plant, they cannot become a relief charge upon the township, regardless of the length of time they were engaged at the plant. This fact was revealed at the regular meeting of Pickering Council on Monday afternoon when a particular case was brought up for discussion. The relief in question must be taken care of by Whitchurch Township, from whence she came to work at the war plant two years ago.

It was feared when the plant brought its first influx of war workers, that these people might become a serious charge upon the township, should many of them require relief at the close of the war, but this matter has been taken care of by this check-back system, as illustrated in the above-mentioned case.

A deputation was present from the 3rd concession requesting council to do something regarding the dangerous condition which exists in a steep grade near the late Dr. Simpson property. It was contended by Mr. Dales, solicitor for Mrs. Simpson that several people along this road were marooned in the winter through inability to drive a car up the icy slope, and negotiate the curve part way up.

The road has been this way for some years, has it not?" asked deputy-reeve Westney.

Mr. Dales agreed.

We have several jobs started now which it is doubtful if we can finish," said the deputy-reeve.

Road Supt. Roy Ward stated that to make the necessary change to eliminate the curve it was estimated the cost would be \$800.

While council felt that it was very late in the season to undertake any such road building, they agreed to look over the situation this week, and see if any minor change could be effected at once to ease the situation.

Several communications were received from the South Pickering Ratepayers' Association requesting that council have a 30-mile speed limit set through Dunbarton, also designate the place where they wished the new polling booth to be established for the new polling subdivision.

Claims for sheep paid included one from Donald White, Brougham, for one Suffolk ram killed; \$50, to Thos. Risebrough one lamb \$13.60, and to Gordon Hamlin, 3 lambs; \$36.

Walter Swift from Forest & Stream Park area told council that the ratepayers there had the creek straightened in that area to the benefit of all, and asked if council would shoulder a balance of \$50 yet unpaid, for the work. Two hundred and fifty dollars had been paid by the ratepayers themselves.

A communication was received from the Highways Department approving of the expenditure of \$10,450.76 for the large new heavy duty truck, snowplow, and wing which the council has purchased.

There were few cases before the council sitting as a Court of Revision to hear appeals against this year's assessment roll. One reduction was made from \$375 to \$350 for W. Kennedy, while claims for lower assessment for W. D. Fast, Mr. McFarlane, and Mudge Boulter, Claremont were disallowed.

Pickering Leading in Loan Drive

County Total \$3,322,500 With Two-thirds Campaign Over

With two-thirds of the campaign over, Ontario County's total for the Ninth-Victory Loan, including both Payroll Savings subscriptions and general sales, stands at \$3,322,500 as compared with an objective of \$5,050,000. While the Payroll Savings amount is well over its \$1,220,000 objective, total returns from general sales up to the end of the 11th day of the campaign were \$2,168,300 or approximately 56 per cent of the objective. While this amount is somewhat above the figure shown at the same stage in the Eighth Loan, the percentages, in view of the higher quota this time, is down from 59.6 per cent.

Leading among the districts is Pickering and Pickering Township, where 82 per cent of the district's \$435,000 quota has been subscribed. The Whitby district is second in line with \$557,050 or 68 per cent of its quota of \$525,000 and the Beaver-ton district is next with 60 per cent of its objective reported.

Oshawa and East Whitby stand fourth in the general sales race, the amount subscribed up to the end of the 11th day being \$1,006,900 as against a quota of \$1,760,000. Sales in the remaining districts in the county are still below the halfway mark, Cannington and Brock having reported only 42 per cent of its \$115,700 objective and the Uxbridge and Port Perry districts each having reached only the 31 per cent mark.

Mrs. R. Philips of Buffalo is here helping to care for her mother, Mrs. Wm. Middleton.


