Secondary School Costs Said Lower If Grouped

County revenues for secondary school purposes will drop sharply as municipalities within the county move to form united high school areas, W. E. Brandon, chairman of York County Education Committee, told county council.

Pointing out that as units within the county form high school areas of their own, they cease to contribute to the pool maintained to pay for county pupils. Mr. Brandon said he could foresee a time not far distant, when nearly all York County would be divided into local high school taxation areas.

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Hill, the chairman reported, a spokesman for the Ontario Department of Education told school board and municipal representatives that if adjacent municipalities united to build a secondary school, with aid of provincial grants, their secondary school expenses would be less than what they now contribute to the county pool. Such a plan would also provide a four-fold secondary curriculum for children of the area, Mr. Brandon said.

County council members representing farming communities protested that despite high contributions, at present many farm children are denied high school education because of lack of local facilities.

Suggestion was made that extension of school bus services would provide a solution, at less expense than erection of new schools. F. A. Burkholder of Markham advised that requests for formation of new high school areas be considered very carefully and that the entire matter be fully investigated.

County council accepted the education report, which contained a clause recommending that no special day be fixed for primary school pupils to visit council sessions. Two home and school associations had asked that a special day be appointed for pupils to attend for instructional purposes.

H. M. Griggs of Mimico, and Graham Patterson, were thanked for their part in publication of a booklet outlining a leadership course conducted in the Lakeshore district last year. Permission was given the education committee to present a brief on the course to the Royal Commission on Education. It was stated that the Lakeshore course was the first of its kind in Ontario, and features of it might be adopted as part of a provincial youth program.
