## Three months for Cattle Theft

Accused Claims Animals were Strays which he kept.

Geo. Edward Bowler, R.R. No. 2, Burketon, was sentenced to serve a total of three months in the county jail for stealing two heifers belonging to Russell Down, East Whitby Township, when he appeared before Magistrate F. S. Ebbs in police court at Whitby.

Asked how he pleaded Bowler said, "I didn't steal the cows, they strayed over into my property. I kept them. I sold one of them to the U.F.O. stockyards in Toronto for \$55. Mr. Down took the other back to his ranch."

His Worship interrupted, "You better enter a plea of not guilty and get on with the case to find out just what did take place."

Mr. Down told the court he had put 40 cattle out to graze on April 1st. "About the middle of April I noticed one of them was missing. I made inquiries, advertised in the papers, but I got no reply."

"Later we put in ten more cattle and about the middle of October I noticed another one was missing. One of my neighbors told me to go over to Bowler's place. I notified the authorities. In the meantime I received word Bowler was going to ship a heifer to Toronto, so my nephew and I went over to visit Bowler."

"He denied having seen any stray cattle and told me he had no objection to my looking around. Once inside his barn I recognized my heifer immediately. It was the second one that had disappeared. When I asked him where he got it he told me he had raised it."

Crown Attorney A. F. Annis, "Were you positive it was your animal?"

"Yes."

Resuming his story Mr. Down said, "Later that day we went back with Township Constable A. J. Pierce, and Provincial Constable Jas. Sutherland and H. W. Quantrill, and Percy Mountjoy, who sold me the calf."

"Bowler started to repeat his story and Constable Sutherland asked him when the calf was born. He told him in the spring. Constable Sutherland pointed out the animal was almost two years old and then Bowler admitted the animal wasn't his."

Provincial Constable M. R. Hodgson told the court the farms in question were about two miles apart.

**Bowler's Story**

Bowler told the court that when he moved in April to his present farm, the property had no fences on it. "This beast," he was referring to the animal he had sold, "strayed in. I put her out. She came back. So I made up my mind that I might just as well let her stay. Later she started to break down fences so I decided to sell her."

Crown Attorney Annis, "You knew it wasn't your animal?"

"Yes."

"I suppose you feel that anything you find on your property and can hide is yours?"

## Join Demand for Western Hard Coal

The Municipal Council has added its voice of protest with that of many other Ontario towns against the general coal situation in this province where the people are being exploited, and forced to handle poor grades at regular prices of better coal. They are denied better coal that could be shipped from Western Canada too.

A resolution passed by the council of North Bay and endorsed by Stouffville and scores of Ontario towns reads thus:

"That whereas there exists shortage of certain qualities of coal for fuel, notably hard coal; and whereas there appears to be a sufficient supply of this type of coal in Western Canada; and whereas the authorities have prevented the transportation of this fuel to Ontario and Eastern Canada, despite the lack of same; and whereas on low-grade Western coal of very inferior quality is offered for sale; it resolved that this Council goes on record requesting those in authority to open the market to Western coal."

The Mayor of North Bay declared that he made an exhaustive investigation of the Ontario coal situation and one large coal dealer is authority for the statement that 25 of his firm's customers were given western hard coal to try out. They found that under tests thorough independent, the results remarkable and now think it is a tragedy that western hard coal is not available to our people. They prefer it anthracite. This coal is equal better than U.S. coal. It is almost smokeless, and it ignites better than anthracite.

The mayor says there is something wrong in the office of the Controller at Ottawa for denying people this coal that is needed badly and at the same time, down on our purchase of U.S. coal when their money is at a premium in Canada.
