Burkholder Farm in Family 120 Years

The one hundred acre farm at lot 35, concession 3 Pickering has been in the Burkholder name for 120 years. The Tribune has learned from the present owner, Jake Burkholder. Mr. Burkholder's grandfather, Christian Burkholder came up from Pennsylvania and took over the location shortly after it had been disposed of by the Crown. In 1876 the farm passed to his son, Noah Burkholder, who remained the owner until 1939, when the present owner took over and now operates the place along with his son Grant.

The Burkholder farm is considered one of the finest in the locality, equipped with all modern conveniences. The barn 100x50 was erected sixty-three years ago by Jas. Bishop of Box Grove. Many virgin pines were removed from this Pickering acreage and taken to Frenchman's Bay to be made up into ship masts.

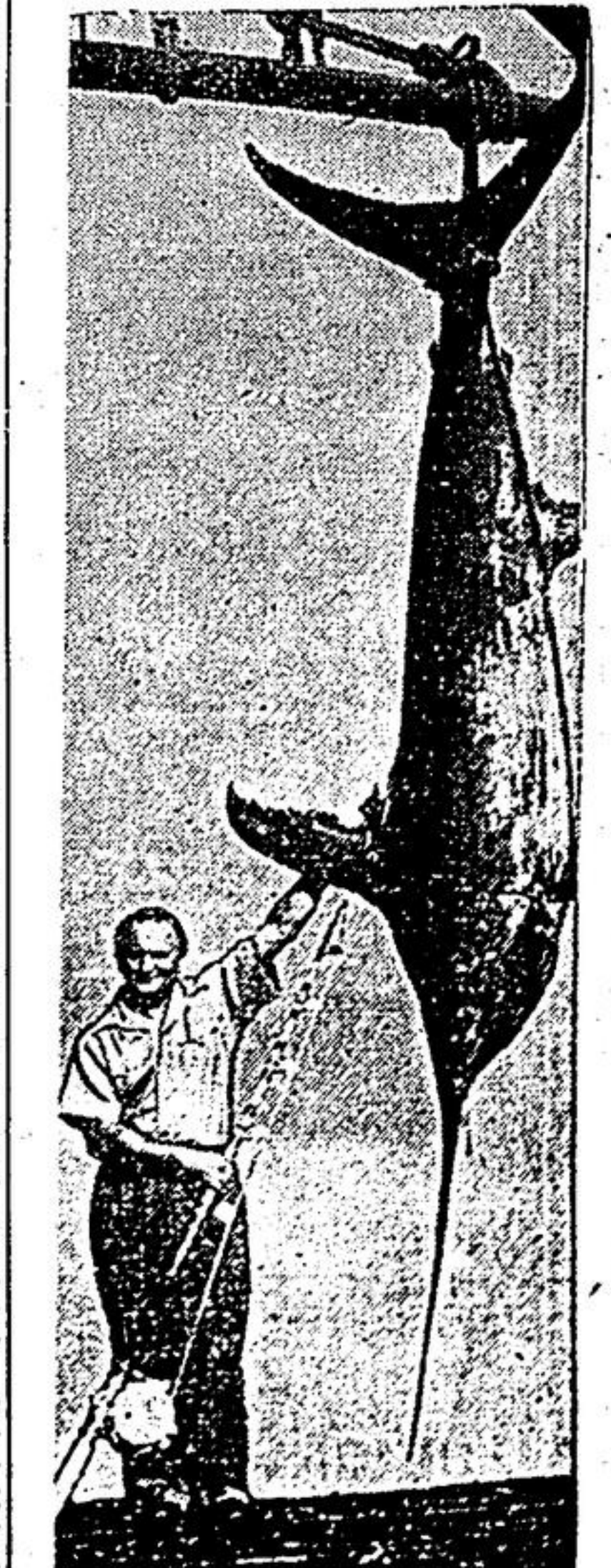
FOURTH AND LAST EXPEDITION TO ARCTIC

Notwithstanding any opinions which may be entertained to the contrary, yet it is official in Ottawa that the expedition to the Canadian Arctic, known as "Exercise Musk-ox," had nothing secret about it and it is not a large expedition. It is merely the fourth and last such exercises, each named after an arctic animal. The first was known as "Eskimo", the second "Polar Bear", and the third "Lemming", with the first as well as second taking place in the winter of 1943-1944 and the third in winter of 1944-1945, each being initiated and held in secrecy by code. However, and this is very much emphasized in Ottawa, there is no such secrecy about this latest "Exercise Musk-ox". It is being carried out under extreme conditions of winter and through the early spring break-up so that the vehicles may be properly tested. Likewise, it should be reported from the capital that, it is anticipated, the benefits derived may be almost of greater value to civilian life than military, though, of course, both are hoped to be benefited as technical and meteorological experts endeavour to learn much from this effort. These facts are mentioned in order to remove any false impressions which may have grown up about this expedition and these facts have been stressed in Ottawa.
