Finds Assault Costly Business

Uxbridge Officer Injured Grappling With Ajax Resident

It doesn't pay to slug a police officer, Donald Linton, 10 Windsor Avenue, Ajax, found out in the Uxbridge police court when he appeared before Magistrate F. S. Ebbs, to answer to a charge of blackening the eye of Uxbridge's Chief of Police Joseph A. Murray, in an Uxbridge pool room on the night of December 15, last.

"I was called by the poolroom proprietor who was complaining about the abusive language Linton was using," Chief Murray told the court. Arriving at the pool room I asked Linton to leave. The next thing I knew I was on the floor and Linton was on top of me trying to gouge my eye.

"I pushed him off and started to get up when he hit me. Constable Thomas Fall and I immediately placed him under arrest."

At this point Crown Attorney A. F. Annis, who had been cross examining Chief Murray, swung around to Linton. "Just what are you laughing about, Linton? This is a serious charge and I see nothing humorous about it." Linton hung his head, but said nothing.

In concluding his evidence Chief Murray told the court he had been unable to put his clothes on unassisted since the fracas because of a sprained shoulder inflicted at the time.

Dr. J. L. McClintock, called to the stand, told the court, he had treated Chief Murray, on December 15, for lacerations of the cheek and a blood clot in the one eye.

Linton, who pleaded not guilty, was asked if he wanted to ask any question. A husky youth in his teens, Linton said: "I wasn't intoxicated, and I didn't hit Joe (Chief Murray)."

"Do you want to ask any questions?" His Worship interrupted. "Never mind telling us what happened. You will get a chance to have your say later. Have you any questions you want to ask the witness?"

"Yes," Linton turned to Chief Murray, he asked, "How do you know I was intoxicated? You never called a doctor."

Constable Thomas Falls was called. "I heard Linton using bad language. Then I saw him throw his arm around Chief Murray and they both fell to the floor. When they were getting up Linton hit Murray in the eye."

When Linton got into the stand he said, "The pool room proprietor asked me to leave. I asked him why. He wouldn't tell me. He just told me to leave. I refused. Then the police arrived. I still refused to go. They started to pull me out. I grabbed hold of a radiator. They both grabbed me and started to pull, and in the scuffle Joe (Chief Murray) and I fell. I didn't hit him."

Crown Attorney Annis, "You don't deny you had been drinking?"

"No."

"No, only beer."

"Do you deny drinking liquor on the day in question with a chap named Simpson?"

"Well, I might have had a little liquor."

Lieut. William Burke Yeates, Linton's commanding officer, told the court that Linton was a good soldier. "He has never been in trouble during his two years service with the army."

His Worship, in passing sentence, said, "What happened is clear. The chief tried to get you out of the pool room where you were causing a disturbance and you refused to go. This is a very serious charge. A man of your age should not resist a police officer. You do not show much respect for law and order. In the first place you are too young to be drinking at all. You have some liberties while in the uniform and in view of your army record I am not going to impose a jail sentence."

"\$25, and costs on the charge of resisting an officer or a month in jail; six months suspended sentence for being intoxicated; and one year on your own reconnaissance of \$100; you must also keep away from any public places in this town during this period. Are you content?"

"Yes."

HOG BUYER JAILED
John Ratner was recently convicted in Regina, Sask., on 17 counts of uttering forged documents and sentenced to serve one day
