## County Council In Busy Session

This week we are opening a new column in the paper, written for The Tribune. It is a resume, day by day, of the matters transacted by the members of York County Council. On Monday, Jan. 15 the council elected one of the members to the highest honor offered by the Council—Warden of the County. Strangely enough all the elected officers of the County, the Warden and Commissioners were representatives of southern municipalities. However let's see more of Monday's election. Three names were offered for the position of Warden, but, with the exception of F. G. Gardiner, Reeve of Forest Hill all declined. Mr. Gardiner, was then declared by acclamation, and after being escorted to the Dias by his sponsors was sworn into office by Judge Parker of York County. During the earlier session of the meeting former Warden Fred A. Lundy, after thanking councillors for their help, received the colors of the Queen's York Rangers on behalf of the county.

At Tuesday's meeting the election of the Commissioners was conducted. These two men, together with the Warden conduct the affairs of the County, between the council meetings. The honors in the election went to Deputy-Reeve W.I. Hurst, of North York on the first ballot. However the second position was contested by Reeve L. Goodfellow, of King and Reeve Thompson of Weston. The Westonian was finally declared the winner. Reeve Lorne Evans of Whitchurch and Reeve Walter Procter of East Gwillimbury will act as House of Refuge Committee for the year, and Reeve Chas. Sparkes of Aurora and Deputy Reeve C.J. McMaster of York were charged with the duties of the Old

The sponsor pointed out that there was a very severe crowding of the Toronto jail, with a result higher cost of the administration of Justice to the taxpayers of the county. "Many of these prisoners will be judged and either found guilty or acquitted. Why can't this be done sooner than it now appears possible?" asked the member. Reeve MacDonald pointed out that there were 640 unconvicted divorce actions now before the courts. With the present Judges on the Bench, it is a serious matter to the County, he stated.
