WILL CONTINUE REFORESTATION LAND PURCHASE

Accepting the recommendation of its reforestation committee, York County Council voted almost unanimously to continue its policy of purchasing sub-marginal land for reforestation purposes.

As for the past two years, council approved of a budget of \$10,000 for this purpose, accepting the content of the reforestation committee that reforestation has many advantages.

Reeve F. J. MacRae, York Township, chairman of finance, advised cutting this item to \$5,000, stating that the tentative budget for 1946 showed that it might be 5.4 mills as compared with 3.80 mills in 1945, an increase of 1.6 mills. "This \$5,000 is not much, but it is these small amounts that taken all together count," he argued, admitting that nearly all agreed that reforestation was an excellent program.

J. Simmons of the Provincial Re-

forestation Department stated that reforestation has a two-fold objective, that of producing timber and preventing flooding and soil erosion. In answer to a question he said that if labor is available that the 1,000 acres owned by the county could be reforested this year. He would not promise, however, that it would be done. He said that his department has 15,000,000 trees available for replanting.

Reeve A.V. Nolan, Stouffville, is chairman of the 1946 reforestation committee with Reeve Frank Burkholder, Markham Village, secretary.

Council approved of the recommendation of its special committee dealing with road allocations. As a result two roads, one in Etobicoke Township and the other in Markham Township, were reverted to their respective townships, having previously been classified as county roads. In both instances, council agreed to do necessary repair work and aid in the construction of specified bridges when replacement is necessary.

The roads in question were "the road between Concession 'A' and 'B' in Etobicoke, commencing at Thistletown and running southerly" and "County Road No. 3, Kennedy road in the Sixth Concession of Markham Township." It is 6.25 miles long, commencing at King's Highway No. 7 at Unionville and running in a northerly direction to the town line between the townships of Markham and Whit-church townships. Reeve Charles Hooper, Markham Township, strongly objected, but his objection was overruled by council. Reeve F. G. Gardiner, K.C., 1946 warden, was the chairman of the special roads committee with Deputy Reeve W. I. Hearst, K.C., secretary.

Reeve Harold H. Glover, North Gwillimbury, and Reeve Kenneth Thompson, Weston, 1945 commissioners for the York County House of Refuge, reported that 51 men and 24 women had been cared for during the year at a cost of \$12,931.17. The budget was \$15,000.

DIAL PHONES IN AUTOMOBILES SAID AVAILABLE IN 2 MONTHS

Radio dial telephones for automobiles no longer are a fantasy. They'll be on the market within two months, and retail at \$500.

Only the official blessings of the federal communications commission stand between these autophones and the luckless motorist who used to enjoy racing about completely out of contact with his office.

If you leave your umbrella in a taxi you'll just dash into the house and ring up the driver.

Frederick T. Budelman, chief engineer of the Link Radio Corp., said his company was ready to go into full production and would do so just as soon as the F.C.C. nods approval.

"It is possible auto-phones will be installed in many taxis within the next two months," Budelman said. "Several companies are already buying the equipment."

Budelman said he expected the present high prices to discourage most individual motorists from purchasing the auto-phones but the telephone companies were interested in installing the instruments on a monthly rental basis.

"When that happens, I think you'll see the use of the phones greatly increased," he said.

Each autophone will have its own individual number, just as an ordinary telephone does now, he explained. Furthermore, your wife will be able to dial you from home or you'll be able to call up and say you're caught in a traffic jam and won't get there in time for dinner.

If ringing bells get on your nerves, Budelman will fix it up so a dashboard light flares when someone dials your number.

"It will have a present range of 50 miles," he said, "and the speed of the car has absolutely no effect on your conversation. I've also tried it out driving through tunnels, and under trestles, and it works just the same."

NEW HEALTH MINISTER WOULD BUILD UP TOWNS



Decentralization of Ontario industry was urged by Ontario's new minister of health, Hon. Russell T. Kelley, at the annual convention of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture in Toronto on Thursday, Jan. 10. Mr. Kelley is the head of a Hamilton advertising agency, secretary of the Wentworth County Federation of Agriculture and has been particularly active in Red Cross blood donor work during the war.

Questioning the wisdom of the efforts of Ontario's big cities to make themselves still bigger, Mr. Kelley said that "we would be better off if we were building up—the small towns." He said that he would propose to the Ontario government that men be sent into Ontario's towns to survey their facilities in shipping, housing, education and labor, and to make this information available to industry. Taking Ontario's industrial population closer to the farms, through building up the towns, Mr. Kelley said, would reduce farm products distribution costs and increase cash returns to farmers.

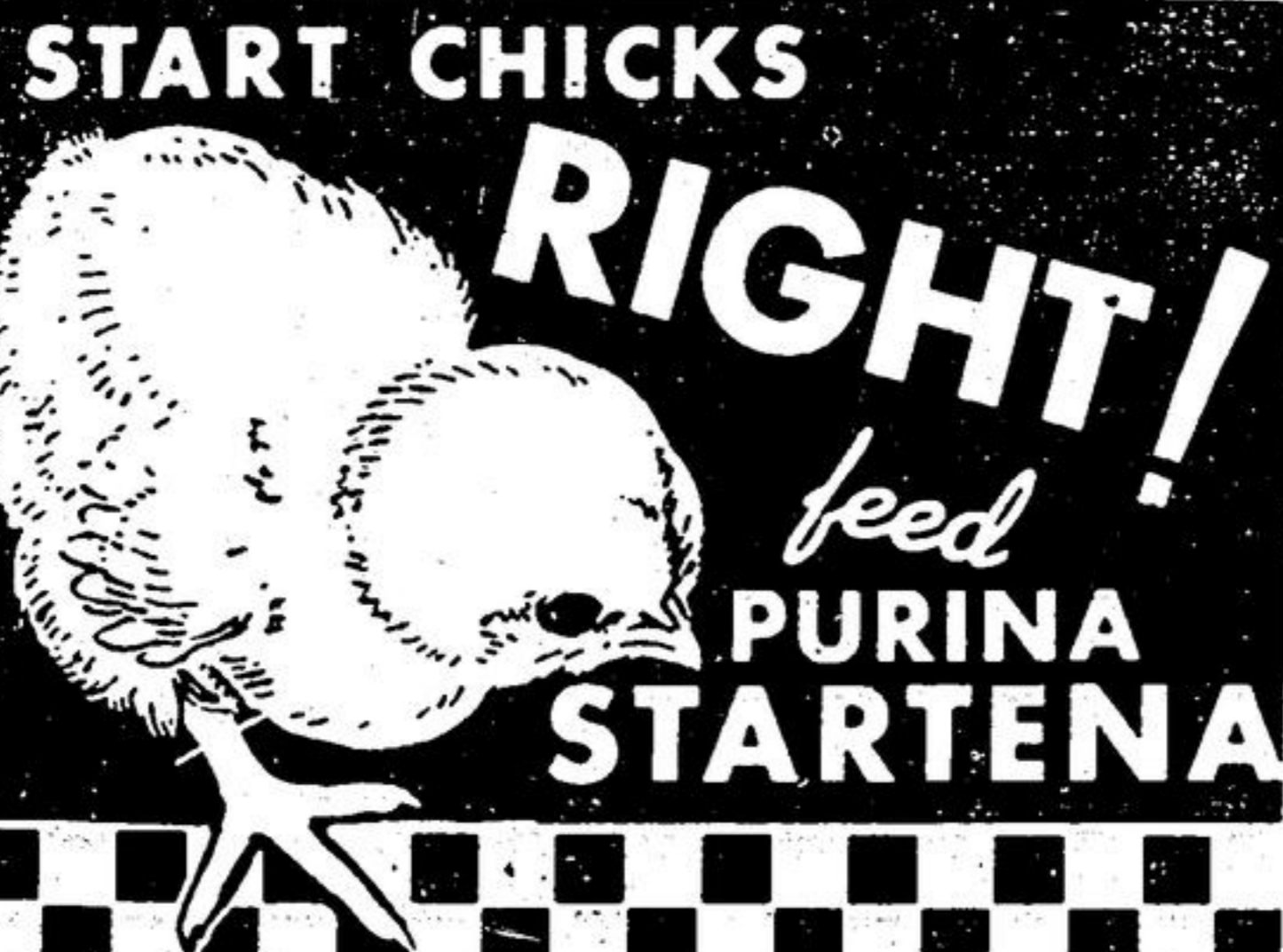
