## Bus Line Opens to Claremont Feb. 9

The Danforth Bus Lines Limited will commence operation of a bus line to Claremont from Toronto on Saturday, Feb. 9th, giving weekend and holiday service. ## W.P.T.B. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q.—I would like to make aprons, oven mitts and pot holders to sell. I would like to know if I could sell to a store, could I sell from my home and how much would I be allowed to charge?

A.—First you must go to the nearest office of the WPTB and obtain a license to commence your business. There is no charge for this license. Then you must submit samples and have the maximum price set. After this has been done you could sell to anyone you liked, either to a store or to individuals and there is no reason whatever why you could not conduct the business from your home.

Q.—How much molasses can I buy with one preserves coupon?

A.—You may purchase 40 fluid ounces with each coupon. We note from your letter that the store where you made your purchase is taking too many coupons and we will have this checked at once.

Q.—If a veteran buys a house can he give the tenants notice to vacate and if so how much notice does he have to give them?

A.—Sorry, he cannot give the tenants notice to vacate. If a veteran owned a house before he enlisted in the Armed Services he may give his present tenants three months' notice to vacate and take possession of his home at the end of that period. However, if he purchases a home now he is in the same position as any other purchaser.

Q.—For about eight years I have taken a cover to the laundry two or three times a year and have always been charged 15c. This time he charged 25c. Is he allowed to raise his price now?

A.—Certainly not. There is still a ceiling price on such charges. The laundry is not allowed to charge more for the same work as it charged in 1941. When price ceilings came into effect a survey was made of all laundries and their maximum prices set. A list showing these prices should be on display in a prominent place in each laundry. Of course prices vary, as each laundry is allowed to charge the same price as in 1941 and as you know at that time there was a great difference in prices. As you did not mention the name of the laundry we cannot check from here, but would suggest you report the details to your nearest WPTB office at once.

Q.—I had a repair job done on my car and believe I was overcharged. The account is enclosed and I would be glad if you would advise me.

A.—We have received so many queries regarding repair charges on automobiles and trucks it is impossible to answer them all in the column. It is very difficult to say whether or not you were overcharged as the prices for parts vary greatly according to the make and model of the car being repaired. We have passed your letter along to our investigation office and you will hear from them direct.
