Q.—How much molasses can I buy with one preserves coupon? A.—You may purchase 40 fluid ounces with each coupon. We note from your letter that the store, where you, made your purchase is taking too many coupons and we will have this checked at once.

Q.-If a veteran buys a house can he give the tenants notice to vacate and if so how much notice does he have to give them?

A .- Sorry, he cannot give the tenants notice to vacate. If a veteran owned a house before-he enlisted in the Armed Services he may give his present tenants three months' notice to vacate and take possession of his home at the end of that period. However, if he purchases a home now he is in the same position as any other purchaser.
