## SELDOM SEEN

There is something about chopping wood that sets it apart from other farm tasks. A man is particular about his axe. It must be razor-edged and just the right heft and balance. One knows when a tool "feels" good to his hands whether it be an axe, hoe or crowbar. In the woodlot above the pasture it is quiet and peaceful. Gray day or sunny, the trees have a message that makes a man forget the outside chaotic world. Chickadees call their throaty refrains, a rabbit dashes from a brush pile with the farm collie in pursuit. Perhaps a ruffed grouse goes up with a startling whir and beating wings. They are all good sounds.

A man can take his time about choosing the trees to harvest. Some oaks, maples and beeches are needed for a steady baking fire; the knotty corks where the limbs are cut off will keep the fire overnight in the parlor base burner. White birches are good for a quick hot fire, good for early morning to get the kitchen warm, good to fry potatoes for supper. There is an invigorating fragrance in the winter air compounded of sodden leaves, pine needles, resin and the aroma from the fresh-cut wood clips. Hour by hour the pile of logs and limbs grows larger and when in the late afternoon the shadows begin to close in and a man shoulders his axe, he knows he has had a good day. Chopping is work, yes. But it's good to work in the woods away from the stress of the world. The evergreens' talk, the satisfying smells, the birds, the sun and the clouds—all these are dividends when a man chops wood on a winter's day.

## Lads Go Through "The Real Thing" in Boys' Parliament

The following report on the Boys' Parliament is written by Donald King, member for North York, and covers sessions of the 25th annual Parliament held recently in Toronto. Donald is a son of Mr. and Mrs. S. W. King of Newmarket, where he attends school, and is a member of Trinity United Church.

"Boys' Parliament is held annually under the auspices of the Ontario Boys' Work Board. This Work Board is in charge of church-centred boys' groups throughout Ontario. This year ninety elected boys, from sixteen to twenty-one years of age, came to parliament representing the boys of Ontario. Our purpose was to work on a Christian basis for the boys of the province.

Many people have expressed the opinion that Boys' Parliament is only a sham. This is certainly not the case. In our Sessions this year held in the Legislative Chambers of Queen's park, I believe we did credit to ourselves as a parliament. Each boy has his choice of belonging to either the Government or Opposition parties. The premier and his own selected cabinet present the legislation in the House for debate. The purpose of the Opposition party of which I was a member is to give constructive criticism to the proposed legislation so that it will be as perfect as possible when passed. The speaker, elected from the government party was Robert Lederman of Haliburton. It is strictly a boys' parliament. Adults have nothing to do with our Sessions or with the legislation. Our parliamentary procedure is very similar to that of our Federal and Provincial governments.

During the morning we were met and interviewed by the premier Bob King of Toronto, leader of the Opposition Doug Lapp of Ottawa, and the secretary of the Ontario Boys' Work Board, Wilbur Howard.

That afternoon, in our first caucus in the University, we were told about parliament and we were introduced to some of the people

in charge of parliament. Later in the afternoon, we had our Oath of Allegiance ceremony in the chapel of the University. We were led in the service by Rev. Gordon Lapp of Keswick. In this Oath, we promised to be faithful and bear true allegiance to the King of kings. That evening, we had our first parliamentary session. The lieutenant-governor of the parliament was Taylor Statten; one of the first of those interested in boys' work. Premier Drew gave us a short address in which he urged us to maintain an interest in government. In the spirited debate on the Speech from the Throne, many of the members told of boys' work in their constituencies. Most of the members, for the first time, saw parliament in action.

During the following days we heard several addresses. Mayor Saunders and Chancellor Brown

welcomed us to Toronto and Victoria University. The retiring premier, George Hobson, spoke to us one evening. We heard addresses on the Christian ministry as a vocation and on the Canadian-Japanese situation. Wilbur Howard spoke to us several times on boys' work.

During the morning and early afternoon, we had caucuses, leadership training periods and we were divided up into groups of six under a cabinet minister to discuss the legislation before it went before the House.

After the Saturday afternoon Session, we were taken by street-car to Riverdale Presbyterian church for our Silver Jubilee Banquet. Members of all twenty-five parliaments were present for this enjoyable reunion.

Our final destination was High House. (Continued on Back Page)
