Top-Price Hereford Bull Fed, Cared For Like Baby

The bidding opened at \$5,000 then soared to \$11,000. For the hundredth time, George Rodanz, proprietor of Ringwood Farms, looked at the cherry red Hereford bull in the Oklahoma auction ring. Even if the bidding was now \$1,000 higher than he expected it to go, he wanted this "Whiteface" for his Stouffville herd.

"Forty-six thousand dollars," he said to the auctioneer. But from across the auction ring came another and higher bid of \$48,000. The crowd was tense. Never had they heard bidding like this. Mr. Rodanz loosened his tie, sat thoughtfully for a moment, and then in a determined voice, jumped the bid \$3,000 to \$51,000. There was a hushed silence. Then the auctioneer's excited voice rang out. "Sold!" he cried. "Sold to George Rodanz of Toronto for \$51,000—a new world's record for a beef cattle bull."

For the first time during the six minutes of bidding, quiet, stocky Rodanz, 37, successful truckline operator and gentleman farmer, was nervous. Fifty-one thousand dollars, he thought, \$56,355 in Canadian funds, was a lot of money to pay for a bull. But he didn't worry long.

Ever since he was a boy of 14, trucking garden produce from Stouffville to Toronto, he had been accustomed to making important decisions. He earnestly believed the bull, Del Zento I, was worth the money.

Although his time is pretty well taken up directing his transport business from the office, Mr. Rodanz still takes an odd turn at driving. But like his brother, Fred, who has been associated with him for years he only takes out a truck now in case of emergency.

As often as he can, Mr. Rodanz slips up to his farm. This is his only hobby. For some years now he has specialized in Hereford cattle because he believes they are the finest beef cattle. His are not ordinary Herefords, however. They are all of the world-famous Hazlett blood strain.

Developed by the late Robert H. Hazlett, of Eldorado, Kansas, Hazlett Herefords represent 40 years of careful selected breeding. It has produced one of the finest strains of beef cattle in the world. Hazlett steers, for example, have dressed as high as 71 per cent live weight. A club calf from Mr. Rodanz's farm has dressed 67 per cent.

It is to continue this Hazlett strain that Mr. Rodanz purchased Del Zento I. "Sure, it's a lot of money for a bull," he says, "but your herd is only as good as your bull. I saw Del Zento I twice before the auction. Each time I liked him more."

Former Markham Pastor Passes

Dr. E. Leslie Pidgeon, one of Canada's foremost United Church clergymen and pastor of Erskine and American United Church since 1925, died Friday following a long illness. He was 72.

As recently as December, Dr. Pidgeon's services were given public recognition when he was unanimously nominated as Moderator of the General Council of the United Church of Canada at a meeting of the Montreal Presbytery.

At one time he served on the McGill University Corporation and on the Board of the Theological College, Winnipeg. He was a trustee

of Queen's University and vice-chairman of the Board of the United Theological College and Knox College, Toronto, and a member of the Board of Divinity Hall.

A native of New Richmond, Que., he received his first mission appointment at St. Andrew's Church, Ford Langley, B.C., in 1896, then five years later was named minister of St. Andrew's Church, Markham. He served also at St. Thomas and Winnipeg, and was named to Erskine Church here in 1925.

Dr. George C. Pidgeon, minister of Bloor St. United Church, Toronto, and John Pidgeon, of Innisfail, Alta., are brothers.
