Behind the decision to disband the RCAF Women's Division from the permanent force is the story that this decision was reached after several hundred Women's Division personnel had been interviewed, with the result that it was discovered that the women considered their work had been done and they wished to return home at the earliest date possible. This has been disclosed in Ottawa by the Chief of the Air Staff Robert Leckie who revealed that lengthy discussions on this subject and preceded this final decision to withdraw the Women's Division from permanent ranks.

In face of the complaints that the regulations discriminated against Protestant clergy and favoured Roman Catholic priests on income tax, it is pointed out in Ottawa that Revenue Minister McCann had said in the last session of Parliament that clergymen of all denominations in Canada were treated "on exactly the same basis" in the application of income tax laws. (This is not accepted as fact however).....Brig. Geoffrey Walsh and a party of advance Canadian Army group have started northward in preparation to take over control of the Alaska Highway from United States forces on April 1.....A brief has been submitted to Premier King in Ottawa by the Agricultural Institute of Canada, an organization of professional men in agriculture, urging the expansion of government-sponsored research personnel on account of the relatively lower salaries paid professional workers in agriculture.....The establishment on the land of about 15,000 veterans will include 6,500 veterans as full-time farmers on improved lands, about 3,000 on provincial Crown lands, and 6,000 under the small holdings provisions of the Veterans Land Act.

Second Markham Baptist Church Shows Progress

The annual business meeting of Markham Second Baptist Church held on Jan. 22nd, indicated that a successful year, spiritually and financially, had been concluded, and that one of the high lights for the new year should be a series of special meetings some time next spring for which a special speaker will be engaged.

The annual meeting, held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Ratcliff was presided over by the pastor, Rev. Norman Rowan. Satisfactory reports were presented by Clerk Robert Ratcliff, Treasurer Charles Clubine, and S.S. Treasurer Andrew Hutchinson, while for the Y.P.S. Douglas Clark reported, and Mrs. Rowan reported for the W.M.S.

It was gratifying to learn that church membership had increased by seven during the year after making good any removals.

Church funds received for the year totalled \$1623.19 of which \$496.13 went to the Home Mission and Foreign Mission work. In addition there were receipts through the Sunday School amounting to \$194.81, and the Y.P.S. \$55.78, also the W.M.S. reported receipts of \$87.50.

Appointments included Mrs. Floyd Ratcliff as organist, Mrs. Clendenning choir leader, and all other officials reappointed.

Mr. Rowan referred briefly to verses 12 and 13 of Philippians: "Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling." Work, he declared, is necessary for the satisfactory growth of the individual and the successful church.

MARKHAM CONSIDERS MEMORIAL

A committee of 25 ratepayers was appointed on Tuesday night at a public meeting in Unionville to look into the question of honoring the Veterans from Markham Township who served in the last war. Mr. W. C. Gohn was named as chairman and the large committee will meet in the township office on Tuesday night next. Their first duty will probably be to take steps to compile a list of soldiers enlisting from the municipality.

VANDORF

A skating party, sponsored by the Thursday Night Club, will be held in Aurora Arena, Wednesday, Feb. 13th. Lunch to be provided by both boys and girls, will be served in Vandorf Hall after skating.

Sleeping car service to New York City and to Niagara Falls, from the Canadian National Railways Central Station, will be resumed February 15th. It was suspended by order of the United States Office of Defence Transportation.
