Glorious Music Make "Song to Remember" Great

Many great motion pictures fall naturally into certain categorical pigeon-holes—a director's picture, a star's picture or the cameraman's. But on rare occasions, one comes along, the greatness of which cannot be ascribed to one, two or even three elements in its composition. Such a film is Columbia Pictures' Technicolor production "A Song to Remember," currently starring Paul Muni and Merle Oberon and featuring Cornel Wilde at the Stanley Theatre on March 4th and 5th. "A Song to Remember" tells the story of the two great influences on the life of the famous composer- pianist, Frederic Chopin—Professor Joseph Elsner, his music master, and the famous woman novelist, pantsweaver George Sand—their bitter conflict over him and his ultimate death.

The producer and writer of the screen play, Sidney Buchman, has done a masterful job of taking this conflict and weaving into it the many romantic melodies which bring more than one glowing memory to even those who are unfamiliar with the names of Chopin's masterpieces. If we should tell you that you'll hear the Mazurka in B-flat and the Scherzo in B-flat minor in their entirety, it might not mean much to you. But when you hear them, you'll say, "Oh, yes I remember that. It's one of my favorites. I just didn't know that was the name of it."
