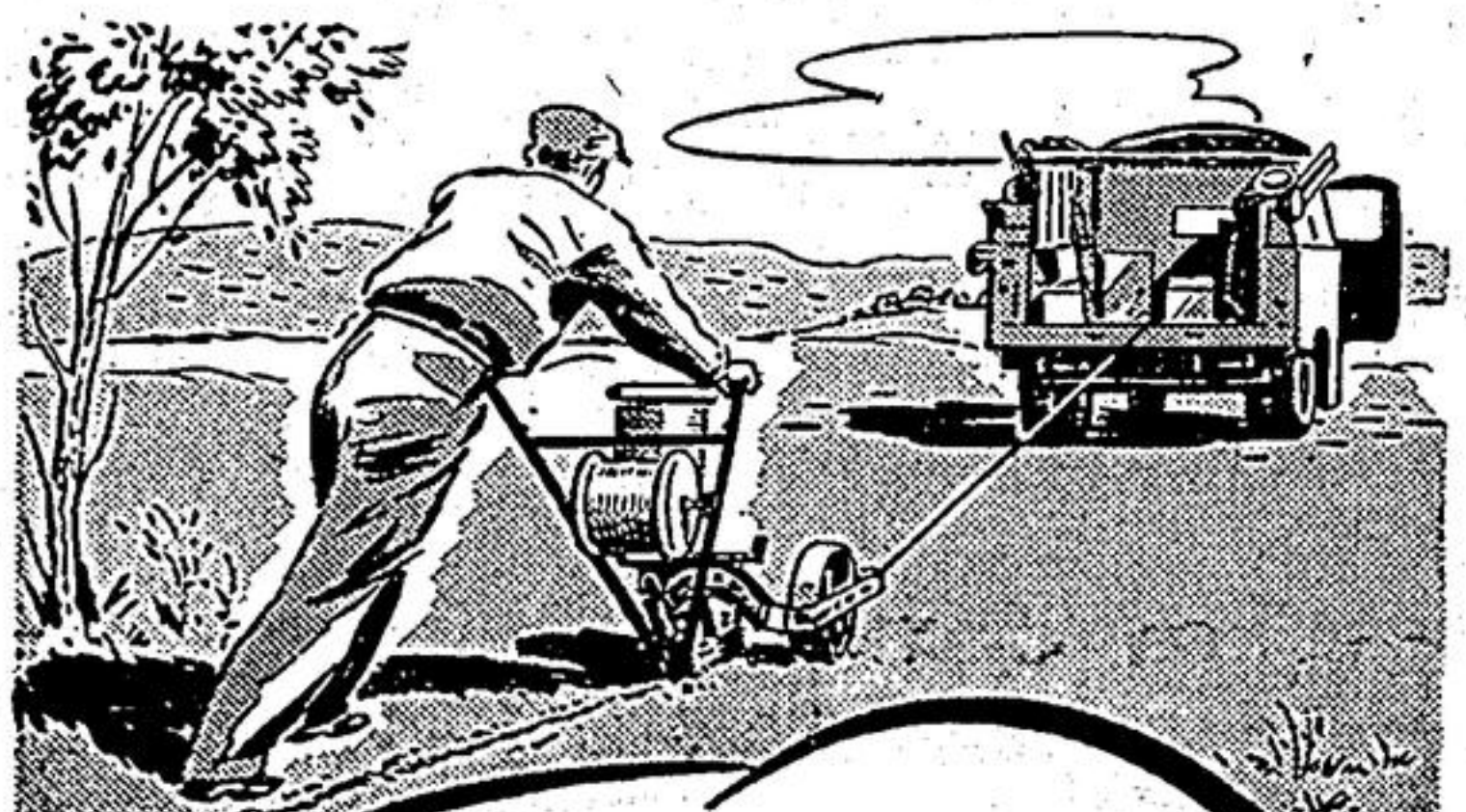

NEW METHODS NEW MATERIALS will help to extend TELEPHONE SERVICE

Quebec and Ontario farms will benefit from the new telephone materials and construction methods to be put into use as soon as men and supplies are available. A type of insulated wire, for instance, can be ploughed directly into the ground. Then there is a steel wire which allows for increased spacing of poles thus reducing construction time and cost.

These are two of many telephone developments which will help bring the telephone to more farm families who want it.

Despite wartime difficulties, nearly 16,000 additional rural telephones were installed in Ontario and Quebec since the beginning of 1940. This increase reflects the intensive efforts of the telephone industry to expand its service in rural areas.



Ont. County Seed Fair to be Mar. 8

At a recent meeting of the Ontario County Crop Improvement Association, arrangements were made for the 7th Annual Seed Fair, to be held in the Port Perry High School, March 8th, 1946.

A very interesting program has been arranged for the day. A speaker has been invited from the Chemistry Department of the O.A.C., Guelph, Ontario, to lead a discussion on "Soils and Fertilizers." Mr. Ken Fallis, speaking at the Crop Improvement Convention in Toronto will address the Seed Fair on "The New Improved Pastures."

The number of entries exhibited at the Seed Fair has continued to increase each year. It is hoped that there will be a large number take part in this show, as it serves as an excellent means of providing good seed in all parts of the county. A seed judging competition is being held for the Junior Farmers in the morning of the Fair. Ten dollars is being awarded to the top boy of the competition to help pay his expenses at the Short Course at the O.A.C.

RESERVE UNITS LIKELY TO SKIP CAMP TRAINING

Historic old Camp Niagara, for a century and a half looked upon as a leading centre for all phases of army training and for many years scene of manoeuvres and pitched white tents, is being abandoned as training headquarters for MD 2, a military official revealed.

The broad common has been deemed unsuitable for modern mechanized training, due to its rough terrain, and in future only infantry units will inhabit the camp for periods not greater than two to three months each summer, he said.

The Niagara-on-the-Lake training field played a strategic part in the training programs of both First and Second Great Wars. Thousands upon thousands of soldiers from all over Canada, underwent year-round training there.

The military spokesman said he believed a new training headquarters will be set up in some other part of the Military District.

He revealed further that many reserve units in MD 2 will not go to camp this summer for annual training, due to disruptions arising out of the reorganization program of the Canadian Army.

NEW FOUNTAIN PENS WRITE UNDER WATER

The first pen produced by the Reynolds International Pen Company (Canada) Limited, in its Oshawa plant, was presented to Premier George Drew by Wing Commander George D. Clarke, president of the company, at an informal ceremony on Saturday afternoon at the company's plant in the Agler Building, Oshawa.

The official opening of the plant, which was sponsored by the Oshawa Chamber of Commerce, was preceded by a reception at Hotel Genosha where executives of the company met members of the Chamber of Commerce, executives and sales staff of the Consolidated Optical Company, which is handling the distribution of the product to the jewellery and drug trades. Also in attendance was Mr. Cranney, an executive of the American Optical Company, Southbridge, Mass., which is the parent company of Consolidated Optical.

Accompanied by his attractive wife, Wing Commander Clarke explained to the visitors the various steps in the production of the revolutionary new pen which will not leak at high altitudes and which will write under water. Groups crowded around the assembly line watching the pens being assembled by girl workers and took a great deal of interest in making various tests with them.
