Uxbridge Woman Assaulted When Leaving Danforth Station

Wife of a Returned Soldier—Both Born in the Northern Town.

Scores of constables and detectives searched the Danforth-Main district on Friday night for a man armed with a gun, who dragged a mother of three children into a lumber yard, criminally assaulted her and robbed her of \$2.50.
Inspector Charles Greenwood, of No. 10 Division, said the woman resides in Uxbridge. She arrived Friday night to visit her son, who is attending a city school and was walking from the Danforth CNR station to Main st. at 8:50 p.m. when grabbed by a man about 30, with a thin, dirty face, flat nose and fair wavy hair. The woman is the wife of a returned soldier, and both she and her husband were born in Uxbridge.

The attacker pushed what is thought to have been a gun against the woman's ribs and forced her into the nearby lumber yard where he criminally assaulted her.
The young mother told police he then demanded that she hand over all her money at the same time keeping the gun pressed against her back. She handed over her purse and he took out the \$2.50.
"After arriving at the station I telephoned my sister in Scarborough and told her I would meet her at Danforth and Main," she said "I was on my way there when attacked."

Even after the assault and robbery the attacker refused to let go of the woman. She told him she had telephoned her sister and that if she wasn't at Main and Danforth the police would be notified. This apparently frightened him and he turned and fled.
The victim returned to the station and telephoned her sister again. They reported the assault and robbery to Main street station and the woman was removed to Toronto East General Hospital.
A posse of police and citizens was organized by Inspector Greenwood and the entire area searched for over nine hours, but no trace of the attacker could be found.
Greenwood said the woman usually arrives Friday night to visit her son on Saturday. "The roadway leading from the station to Main street is very dark and the man must have been hiding in the lumber yard waiting for a victim."
