INJURED IN HAYRIDE, MAY NOT WALK AGAIN
 Theresa Grondin, 16-year-old schoolgirl, was one of some 40 young people on a hay-ride party in Windsor, Ont., which ended with 11 in the hospital following a collision between an automobile and wagon bearing the hay-ride party. Doctors had little hope that she will ever walk again because of spinal injuries which may bring permanent paralysis to her lower limbs. Another of the young people, Stella Martin, died this week. Her back was broken in the accident.

THREE FAINT PARTICIPATING IN MARRIAGE CEREMONY
 A correspondent has been good enough to inform us about a near tragedy that happened down in Sussex, Wis., at a wedding ceremony. Apparently the groom was so lovesick that he fainted during the ceremony. Then his brother, Floyd, fainted. A second later one of the attendants went into a swoon. The survivors of the ordeal rendered first aid. We are not informed on the reason for the unfortunate situation which must have marred the happiness of the occasion.

RETIRED FROM FARM AT NEAR 80, THOS. REYNOLDS PASSED IN WINNIPEG
 Retired from active farming in Western Canada only during the recent war, Thos. H. Reynolds died in Winnipeg at the advanced age of 82 years. He gave up active work only when the army called up his two farm hands, one having been with him eleven years and one seven. The late Mr. Reynolds was a native of Uxbridge Township, and is survived by a wife but no family. There also survives two sisters and two brothers and one half brother. They are Mrs. Robt. Hope of Stouffville, Mrs. Thos. Hunt, in Michigan, Fred Reynolds of Stouffville and Frank in Western Canada. The half-brother is Walter Reynolds living in the States and who is over 85.
