FARMED FOR YEARS MINUS ONE HAND

What can be accomplished by persons with affliction is well demonstrated in the case of Thos. Anderson, 4th concession of King township who carried on the business of farming for many years despite the fact that he was minus one hand. According to the Aurora Banner Mr. Anderson recently celebrated his 84th birthday and recalled his journey to Canada from England in 1887, coming to York and his early farming at Hoggs Hollow. He later followed the tannery business at Uxbridge and Kinghorn. He returned to England for his bride, Judith Ingledew, who passed away several years ago.

Mr. Anderson has successfully farmed at King and despite the handicap of possessing only one hand, has mastered the art of farming, wood-cutting, handling horses and other tasks that many find hard enough with two hands.

Township to Handle Clothing Collection Through Schools

The appeal for clothing for the war-stricken countries of Europe is to be handled by Pickering Township in June through the twenty-two schools in the municipality. The clothing is to be brought to the schools on June 17 and 18, and the Township trucks will pick the bundles up from there and transport them to the city depot. This arrangement was agreed upon at the regular meeting of Pickering Township council held on Monday afternoon.

There was some discussion on the daylight-saving question, but members did not think it necessary to issue any specific proclamation. All members voiced their approval of the entire township turning to the new time.

It was revealed by the Board of Health, that Miss Ruth Kilpatrick of the School of Nursing, University of Toronto, is serving with the Township, getting experience for a month, to assist her in her studies for public health nursing.

There was only one sheep claim passed for payment, that to Wilbur Johnson, for two lambs killed, amounting to \$16.10.

Contingency accounts passed for payment, amounting to \$1356.15; relief accounts, \$167.78; roads, \$3997.24. Clerk Lloyd Johnson received an increase of \$200 to his salary.

Road Supt. Roy Ward announced that a 40-ton car of dust layer was on order, and would be available to the ratepayers as in former years at half price, which amounts to approximately 70c. per bag.

CEILINGS SET ON SPECIFIC CUTS OF PORK

Retail price ceilings have been established on specific cuts of fresh, cured, frozen, smoked or cooked pork, Wartime Prices and Trade Board recently announced.

Retailers from now on will be required to follow a standard method of cutting similar to that which has been in effect for some time for beef, veal and lamb, the Board announcement said. The sale of any cuts not authorized by the order is prohibited.

The order went into effect April 29 and all retailers are now obliged to display a pork price chart, already distributed.

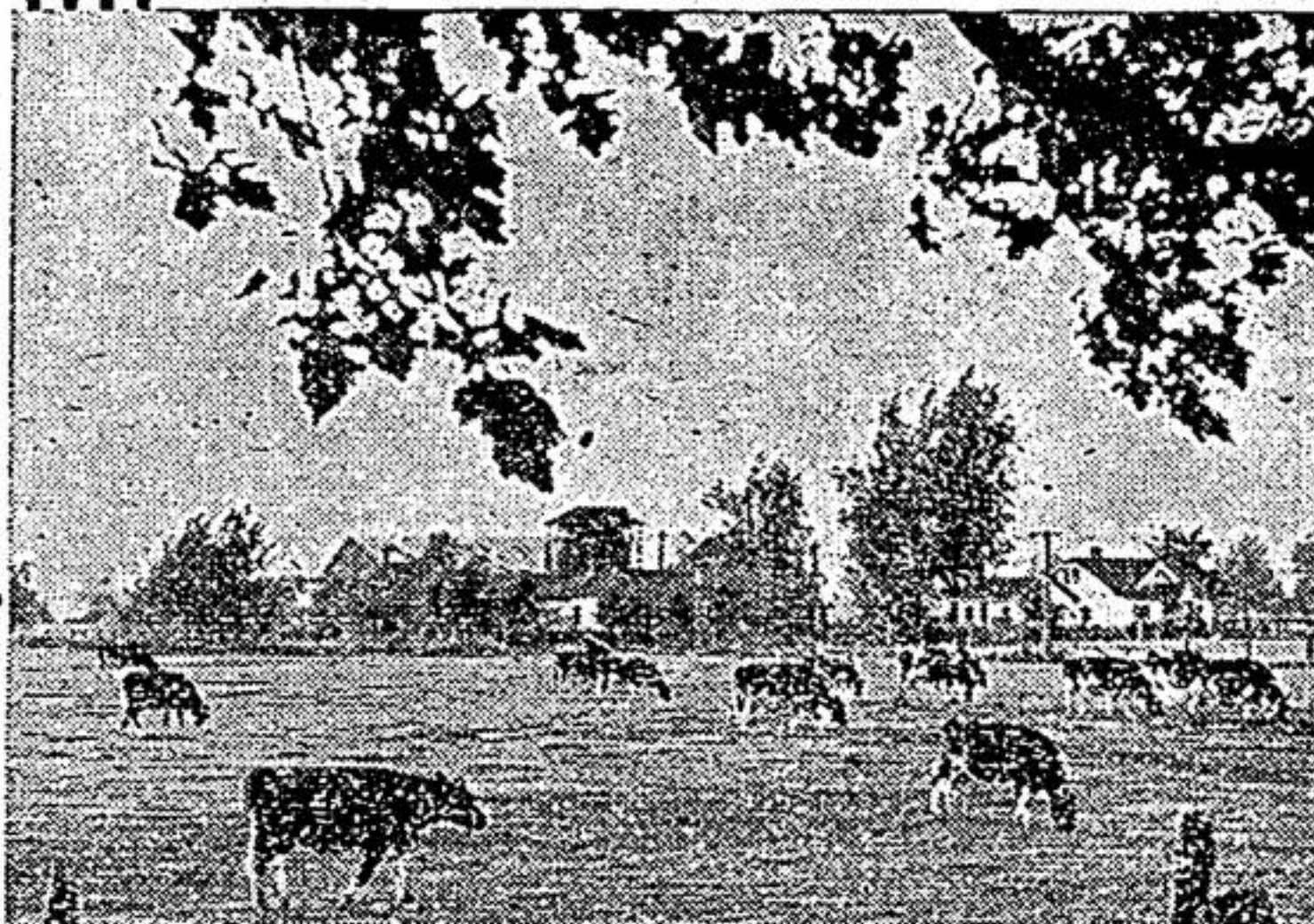
