KNEE-HI TAUGHT TORONTO CHILDREN SAFETY

Knee-Hi, the little wire-haired terrier, who nearly five years ago gave lessons in safety to the school children of The Star, died in Philadelphia where she had been living in retirement. Knee-Hi, age 13, had demonstrated safety to more than 12,000,000 school children in more than 8,000 schools in Toronto, Philadelphia, Washington, Baltimore, Detroit, Buffalo, Miami and numerous other places.

For her contributions to safety, Knee-Hi, owned by Dr. George E. Brunson, had been awarded more than 200 certificates, medals, badges and diplomas and the state of Pennsylvania honored her with a teacher's certificate.

Knee-Hi's safety demonstrations were made into motion pictures and appeared on the screen across Canada. Her first safety lesson in Toronto was Sept. 19, 1941. Police figures showed that traffic accidents dropped from 11 a month to five that October and only two from Nov. 1 to Nov. 20, when the Toronto board of education honored this little dog with a dinner at the Royal York. Attending also was the mayor, other members of the city council and representatives of the police department.

When it was revealed that accidents in Toronto had dropped 30 in 1942, to 53, Trustee Dr. E. A. Hardy, at a meeting of the board of education, credited Knee-Hi with "having done more to promote safety in Toronto schools than all other campaigns and lessons put together." Knee-Hi was buried in the Francisvale cemetery for pets.

HIGHER MILK PRICES

In view of some misunderstanding we repeat that the Dominion Government has advised the Agricultural Food Board that subsidy on milk and milk products during the 12 months beginning May 1, 1946 will be continued on the same basis as last year.

The subsidy of 10 cents per pound of butterfat used in the manufacture of creamery butter and of 20 cents per 100 pounds on milk used in the manufacture of cheddar cheese will be paid throughout the year.

A subsidy of 35 cents per 100 pounds on fluid milk will be paid to producers in authorized areas from May 1, 1946 to September 30, 1946 and 55 cents per 100 pounds from October 1, 1946 to April 30, 1947 except in certain areas where it will continue at 25 cents.

For milk used in the manufacture of concentrated milk products and of milk sugar, subsidy will be paid at the rate of 15 cents per 100 pounds from May 1, 1946 to September 30, 1946. This will be raised to the winter level of 30 cents per 100 pounds at October 1, 1946.

The government's announcement that the removal of the consumer subsidy of 2c per quart or fluid milk is not relished by the dairy industry, or the consumer who will have to pay 2c per quart more for milk.

MILK TICKETS and the CHANGE in the PRICE OF MILK

The Ontario Milk Control Board has announced that:

"Milk Tickets purchased at the subsidized price (prior to June 1st) and in the hands of consumers on June 1st will be worth 2c. per quart less than the legal price which will be in effect on June 1st."

This means that it will be necessary for consumers using these subsidized tickets, to pay an additional two cents per quart along with cash ticket on and after June 1st, when the distributors will revert to the legal prices in the various markets in Ontario.
