Creameries all over the Province, anxious to improve the quality of their butter, have entered the Ontario Creamery Association competitions which started on May 1, it is reported by C. E. Lackner, Director of the Dairy Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture. Five different competitions are being sponsored this year, one of these being a "Keeping Quality" competition. Prizes in this competition go to the creameries whose butter keeps the best in cold storage. This is considered a very important competition as much of the summer make of butter must be held in storage for winter use. Cream producers in general are interested in these competitions, as the better the cream supplied the better will be the butter produced.
