Making plans for leaving hospital to return home later in the week, Robert James Scott, a former president of the United Farmers Co-operative Co., died suddenly as a result of a heart seizure, in St. Michael's hospital, Toronto, on May 21.

Mr. Scott, who was to have attended the international farmers conference which began in London on May 21, had been in hospital for several weeks.

W. A. Amos, Port Dover, president of the United Farmers Co-operative Co. helped Rev. G.A. Milne, Brussels, conduct the funeral service at Mr. Scott's home in Belgrave on May 24.

Of pioneer stock, Mr. Scott was born in Belgrave, Huron county, in April, 1900, on the family farm which he has operated for a number of years. He attended Wingham high school. Mr. Scott served the Ontario farm and co-operative movements for more than a quarter of a century since he entered farm organizational work as secretary of Belgrave U.F.O. club in 1920, and was quite well known to many co-operative workers at Stouffville.

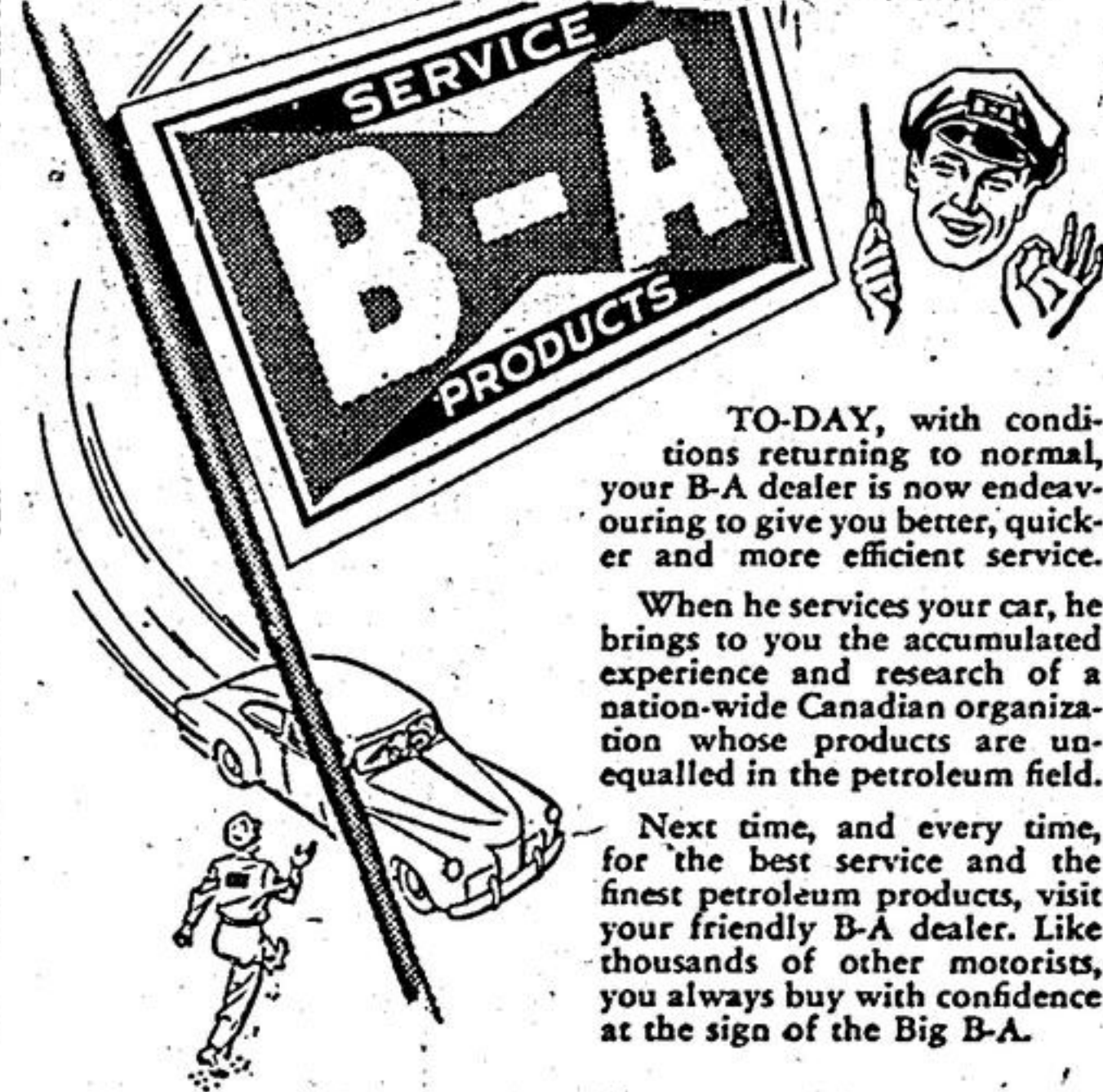
