HONEYMOON TRIP HALTED AS 10 HURT IN 3-CAR CRASH

Four people were admitted to Toronto East General hospital, three cars were badly damaged and a honeymoon delayed as a result of an accident involving 10 people on the Kingston Road highway.

Provincial Constable Gilbert Robinson said Arthur Lee, 20, of Amroth Ave., Toronto, and his bride, Mildred, 21, were on their way to Peterboro following their marriage at 7 p.m. Saturday. They were in taxicab driven by Charles Kelly, 27, of Peterboro, accompanied by Katherine Davis, Amroth Ave., and Janet Davis of Peterboro, who had motored up from there in the same taxi to attend the wedding.

A second car, driven by James Hough, Coxwell Ave., had pulled over to the side of the road, and Hough, with Ida Aquiline, Amroth Ave., walked back about 30 feet to the taxi, which was also parked. While they were talking to the occupants of the taxi a coupe driven by Morris Keeler, 19, of Highland Creek, collided with the rear of the taxi, which in turn collided with the back of the Hough car, sending it 120 feet across the highway to the ditch on the north side.

The occupants of the coupe, Keeler, John Bland, 21, and Ernie Northcott, all of Highland Creek, were thrown through the windshield of their car, while the bride was tossed into the front seat of the taxi and the driver up in the back seat.

Katherine Davis, James Hough, Ida Equiline and the groom, Arthur Lee, were all knocked down by the doors of the taxi as they stood in the road.

The bride received a broken nose and severe bruises, while the groom has an injured leg and abrasions. They returned to the home of the groom on Amroth Ave.

Constable Robertson said liquor had not been a factor in the accident.
