Farmer Fined on Cruelty Charge

Saying that he was probably a victim of the present day shortage of farm labor and that he had a good record in the community, Magistrate F. S. Ebbs in Police Court at Whitby assessed William Pugh, R.R.1, Myrtle, \$10 and costs after finding him guilty of the charge of ill-treating and abusing the cattle on his farm.

At the trial two weeks ago Dr. A. E. Black, Brooklin veterinary and G. Johnston, of the Oshawa Humane Society, had testified that the condition of the animals and barn was bad and that the cattle appeared not have had enough food for some time. Judgment was reserved until last Tuesday.

In passing sentence Magistrate Ebbs said that the condition had since been remedied and that the age and health of the accused had probably made it difficult for him to look after the animals properly. Taking into consideration the high costs of the action, because of the necessity of expert witnesses, he imposed the fine of \$10.

Mr. Pugh was a highly respected citizen, and did much to improve the standard of his cattle breed over the years. Farmers of very high standing came forward to testify on behalf of the accused, and vouch for his good citizenship, which is well known of course over Pickering.

Rubbish in Lovers' Lane was Stolen Bonds from Minden

James Manderson, 26, saw what he thought was a pile of rubbish on a sideroad a half a mile east of No. 12 highway, near Myrtle station, north of Whitby, but paid no attention to it. It was not until six hours later, when he was reading in the paper about the Minden Bank of Commerce robbery that it occurred to him that the "pile of rubbish" might have been bonds and securities. It turned out to be a pile worth about \$50,000.

James dashed out of his home with his father, Arthur, and drove to the lonely stretch of road. There in the bushes they filled two bushel baskets with bonds and securities. Nearby was a cold chisel and broken locks and 30 safety deposit trays with their heavy steel containers.

Arthur Manderson said that addresses on the securities were from Minden and the father and son transported the equipment back to their farm and notified provincial police. The men said it was a very lucky day because it is a side road very rarely used and is known in the locality as a "lovers' lane."

It is in deep bush and police said that this is the spot where the thieves who robbed the safety deposit vault at Minden Saturday night sorted out their loot. Police believe that non-negotiable bonds, securities, wills and valuable papers were left at this lonely spot and then the gang left for Toronto, a short time later dumping a \$100,000 of non-negotiable bonds in North York township.

Police said with this find they believed the loss in bearer bonds, jewelry and cash would aggregate about \$50,000.

The exact value of bonds found will not be known until a member of the bank's head office in Toronto arrives in Whitby to make a count, police said. Many of them are rain-soaked. Also found were wills and deeds.

No clue has been found regarding the identity of the robbers, who police believe were from Toronto. Tire marks indicated where they drove in from the road for a mile and a half and then in a southerly direction along a narrow path. Police said the boxes could "be quite easily sprung open."

Also found were some war savings certificates which, like registered bonds, are worthless to the gang, police stated. Police theorized the bearer bonds found were probably left by mistake. They said they believed the robbers would hang on to the bearer bonds, which there is very little hope of tracing unless the person selling one gives his right name and the number of the bond is kept by the owner. Police said in most cases of bond theft, the owners do not have the numbers.

Inspector W. J. Franks of the C.I.B., provincial police, is still in Minden checking on the loss. Some is jewelry, including a diamond brooch worth \$400 and several diamond stick pins worth about \$100.

This discovery added to the \$101,000 in registered bonds found Sunday by John MacKenzie, Soudan Ave., while motoring with his wife. His find led to a check with provincial police at Haliburton and Lindsay, who found the bank had been broken into and all safety deposit boxes gone.
