SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Lesson for June 16

Golden Text.—"Thy kingdom come.
Thy will be done in earth, as it is
in heaven.—Matt. 6:10

The Lesson as a Whole

The kingdom of God, in its widest
sense, is the authority of Heaven
over all the universe. But as pre-
sented in the prophets, it had to do
with the recognition of the Lord
Jesus Christ as King over Israel
and the nations. Both John the
Baptist (Matt. 3:2) and the Lord
Jesus (Mark 1:15) announced the
Kingdom as at hand. It was offered
to Israel (Matt. 12:28), and when
they refused it the Lord declared
it should be taken from them and
given to a nation bringing forth the
fruit thereof (Matt. 21:43). That
nation is restored, regenerated
Israel in the latter days, when
Christ returns as Son of man to
bring in the Kingdom in power and
glory. Meantime, all who believe in
Him and acknowledge Him as
earth's rightful Ruler enjoy the
spiritual blessings of the Kingdom
of God now (Rom. 14:17). Though
living in a world that is in rebellion
against its lawful Sovereign, they
are responsible to yield implicit
obedience to the One who is soon
to be crowned as King, while they
labor and pray that the Kingdom
may come, when God's will shall
be done on earth as it is in Heaven.

The claims of Christ are, and, in
the very nature of things, must be
paramount in every human life. If
He were only man—even the best
men—such demands would be ab-
solutely preposterous. No human
being has the right to demand com-
plete subjection, even in the most
personal matters, from any of his
fellows. But Jesus Christ is God
incarnate; therefore He has the
right to exact complete submission
on the part of His professed fol-
lowers.

What is commonly called the
Lord's Prayer is really the disciples'
prayer, which was outlined for
them by the Lord, as an example of
how to present their petitions to
the Father in view of the coming
Kingdom.

Verse by Verse
Luke 9:23.—"Let him deny him-
self." This is far more than to be
self-denying. It means to refuse to
acknowledge the claims of self al-
together and to yield implicit obe-
dience to the Lord Jesus. To take up
the cross implies that one is ready
to die, if need be, for His sake. A
man carrying a cross in those days
was on the way to his own execu-
tion.

Verse 24.—"Whosoever will save
his life shall lose it." He who is
more concerned about present com-
fort than for devotion to Christ will
fail, after all, to get the best out of
life. He will realize at last that all
has been wasted. But "whosoever
will lose his life"—that is, shall
give up worldly pleasures and pros-
pects for Christ's name's sake, will
get the very best out of life in the
end.

Verse 46.—"A reasoning.... which
of them should be greatest." The
disciples had not understood the
true nature of the Kingdom of God.
They still thought of it as a place
of earthly glory, where one might
vie with another for power and
influence.

Verse 47.—"Jesus.....took a child,
and set him by him." The child, in
the simplicity of its faith, is the
ideal subject of the Kingdom. The
Lord Jesus designed to use this
little one to teach His followers the
importance of lowliness and meek-
ness.

Verse 48.—"Whosoever shall re-
ceive this child in my name receiv-
eth me." He had come to take the
lowest place. He had laid aside the
outward glory of deity in order to
make God known to man, and as
the humbled One He considered all
done for the lowly and needy as
done unto Him: Every service done
to the least of those who belong to
Him will be rewarded.

Verse 57.—"Lord, I will follow
thee whithersoever thou goest."
This was the hasty exclamation of
one who did not realize what his
words involved and who spoke

without having counted the cost of
true discipleship.

Verse 58.—"The Son of man hath
not where to lay his head." His was
a path of rejection, and He would
have His followers know that to be
His disciples might mean to become
homeless wanderers on the face of
the earth, outcasts for the Gospel's
sake.

Verse 59.—"Suffer me first to go
and bury my father." It was natural
claims first, and this could not be
if the Lord Jesus Christ was to be
owned as Lord (Matt. 10:37). When
He calls upon one to follow Him,
He will be responsible for the conse-
quences to the family connec-
tions.

Verse 60.—"Let the dead bury
their dead." That is, let those un-
awakened as to the value of eternal
things, who are dead to the claims
of Christ, attend to some of the
necessary things of this life, which
they can and will do, but let the
one called from the death of sin
and commissioned to preach the
Kingdom of God put this above
every other responsibility.

Verse 61.—"I will follow thee;
but..." To put anything else be-
fore the call of God is to fail to
recognize the importance of the
divine commission. This man in-
tended to follow Christ eventually,
but not until other matters were,
as he thought, satisfactorily dis-
posed of. He who brings in a "but"
of any kind, when Christ summons,
shows that he has failed to recog-
nize the seriousness of trifling with
the trust committed to him.

Verse 62.—"No man.....looking
back, is fit for the kingdom of God."
He who puts "his hand to the
plough," in the work of the Lord,
must look right on if he would plow
a straight furrow. Indecision and
procrastination are unworthy of
one called to follow Christ (Heb. 10:
38).

WESTERN CROP REPORT

Winnipeg, June 10—Rain report-
ed in many sections of the West,
particularly throughout southern
Alberta and in the form of local
showers in southern Saskatchewan
and Manitoba, terminated a lengthy
dry spell which had been a matter
of concern at most points in West-
ern Canada as seeding of the corn
was nearing completion, according
to the weekly crop report of the
Department of Agriculture of the
Canadian National Railways. A
small percentage of coarse grain
and some flax remain to be sown,
the latter being delayed by farmers
who are waiting for additional rain-
fall. Weed growth is heavy in some
northern sections, particularly wild
oats, which have necessitated
ploughing down and reseeded.

MEMO CLARIFIES BINGO RULING

A memorandum read at city
council from the Attorney General's
Department clarifying the regula-
tions regarding lotteries, raffles,
bingos and other games of chance,
points out that while no new law
has been passed, neither the
Attorney-General nor anyone else
has authority to grant permits to
operate bingo games or to hold
lotteries or raffles except as pro-
vided in the Criminal Code.

The Code defines a gaming house
as a house, room or place kept or
used for playing therein at any
game of chance, or any mixed
game of chance and skill in which
the whole or any portion of the
proceeds is directly or indirectly
paid to the person keeping the
place, or any fee is charged or paid
by the players for the right of par-
ticipating. This does not apply,
however, to any place while occu-
pied by an incorporated bona fide
social club if the whole or any por-
tion of the proceeds is not paid to
the persons keeping the place and
no fee in excess of 10 cents per hour
or 50 cents per day is charged to
the players. Further, it does not
apply in the case of such a place
being "occasionally used" by charit-
able or religious organizations for
playing games for which a direct
fee is charged to the players if the
proceeds are to be used for the
benefit of any charitable or relig-
ious object.

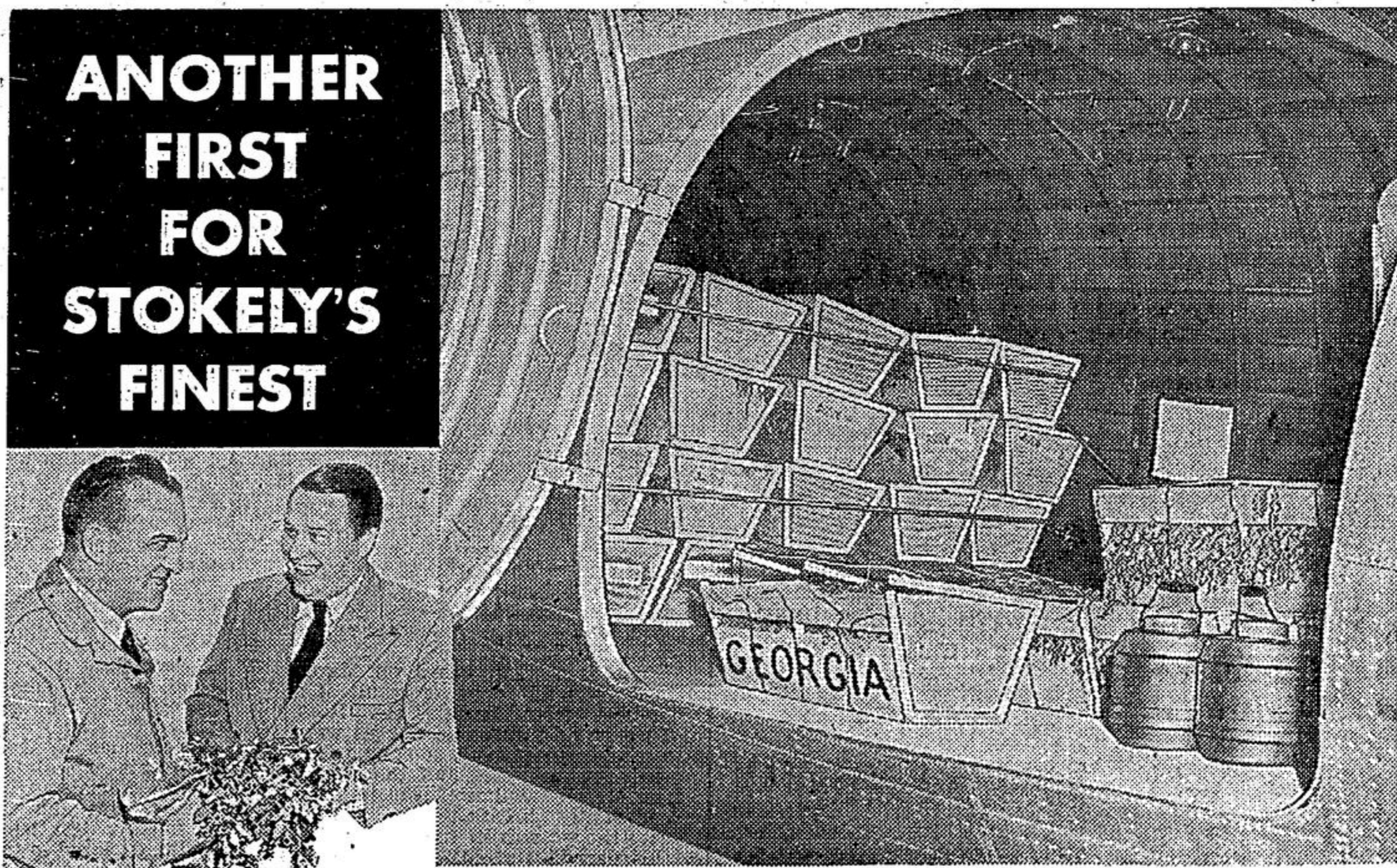
The memorandum points out that
while the word "occasionally" used
in this section, has never been
judicially defined, it is thought that
a regular weekly, bi-weekly or
monthly game would not be held
to be an "occasional" game.
