**Province Will Build Roads for Northern Township**

100% of Construction on Improvement or New Construction States Col. Welsh, M.P.P.

Although the Government has not sought to advertise their new policy over and above their ability to fulfill their promises, it nevertheless has been made possible this year for townships in the north to have the Department of Highways do construction work necessary on their roads at no cost to the municipality, the maintenance to be continued by the township under the present arrangements.

This was announced in Bracebridge last Thursday afternoon by the Hon. Arthur Welsh, M.P.P., when speaking at the Muskoka District Progressive Conservative Association.

"It was decided this year," said the member, "to make it possible for townships in the northern Districts to enter into agreement with the Province to have the Department of Highways build roads where necessary and desirable.

"It is realized that the townships have not sufficient assessment to pay for good motoring roads through large sections where the roads are necessary. It will now be up to the townships to put their propositions before the Department of Highways and convince them of the necessity of the road-work requested. It will be realized that it will take awhile until the Department can get all the work done, yet the municipalities should start proceedings after they have carefully considered their needs.

**BALLANTRAE TEAM SCORE HIGH**

At the Aurora Horse Show Herb Simpson carried off a goodly share of prizes in the horse events, when he was awarded three firsts and two seconds, and four fourth prizes.

The Simpson team from Ballantrae also captured first prize for the best Percheron or Belgian team on the grounds, and the one animal was awarded the grand champion prize for best mare on the grounds.

**DON'T DESERVE LENIENCY PRISONER TELLS MAGISTRATE**

"I know I do not deserve leniency and it is not for my sake that I plead, it is for my three and a half year old motherless child who will have no one to support her if I am sent to prison," pleaded Lawrence Fournier, 31, when he appeared before Magistrate John E. Pritchard at Newmarket court for sentence on a charge of uttering a cheque for \$118.24.

In passing sentence the magistrate asserted that it was unfortunate for the accused that he had a long record starting with his first imprisonment at the age of 21.

"You have served two years in Kingston penitentiary for forgery, and the question now is whether I should send you back. However, since you went straight for three years while in the army I am not going to send you to Kingston, but sentence you to 18 months dating from June 7," said His Worship.

At the close of court Fournier approached Crown Attorney Arleigh Armstrong and, shaking his hand, apologized for his crimes, promising to turn over a new leaf when he becomes free again. Mr. Armstrong remarked that it was rare to hear prisoners make such statements after sentence has been imposed.

Convicted of dangerous driving, failing to remain at the scene of an accident and driving while his license was under suspension, Leo Oliver of Sutton was fined \$100 and costs or two months on the first conviction, \$25 and costs on the second and \$50 and costs on the third count. Including costs, fines totalled \$217.75.

In answer to a statement made by Oliver that he had not been aware of striking a car, Magistrate Pritchard declared it practically impossible to strike a car and not know that a collision has occurred.

**ILLEGAL BEER**

Charged with having beer not purchased on their own permits, Leslie Alfred Moffatt and Mrs. Ronald Vaughan of Whitchurch Township were convicted and remanded one week for sentence. A similar charge against Ronald Vaughan was dismissed.

Constable Ronald Watt told the court he found three cases of beer in a farmhouse occupied by the three accused. He said they told him it had been purchased in a Queen street beer store, but upon checking the records of the store found no trace of the purchase.

Miss Evelyn McVey of Toronto is spending a couple of weeks with Charles and Mrs. McTaggart.

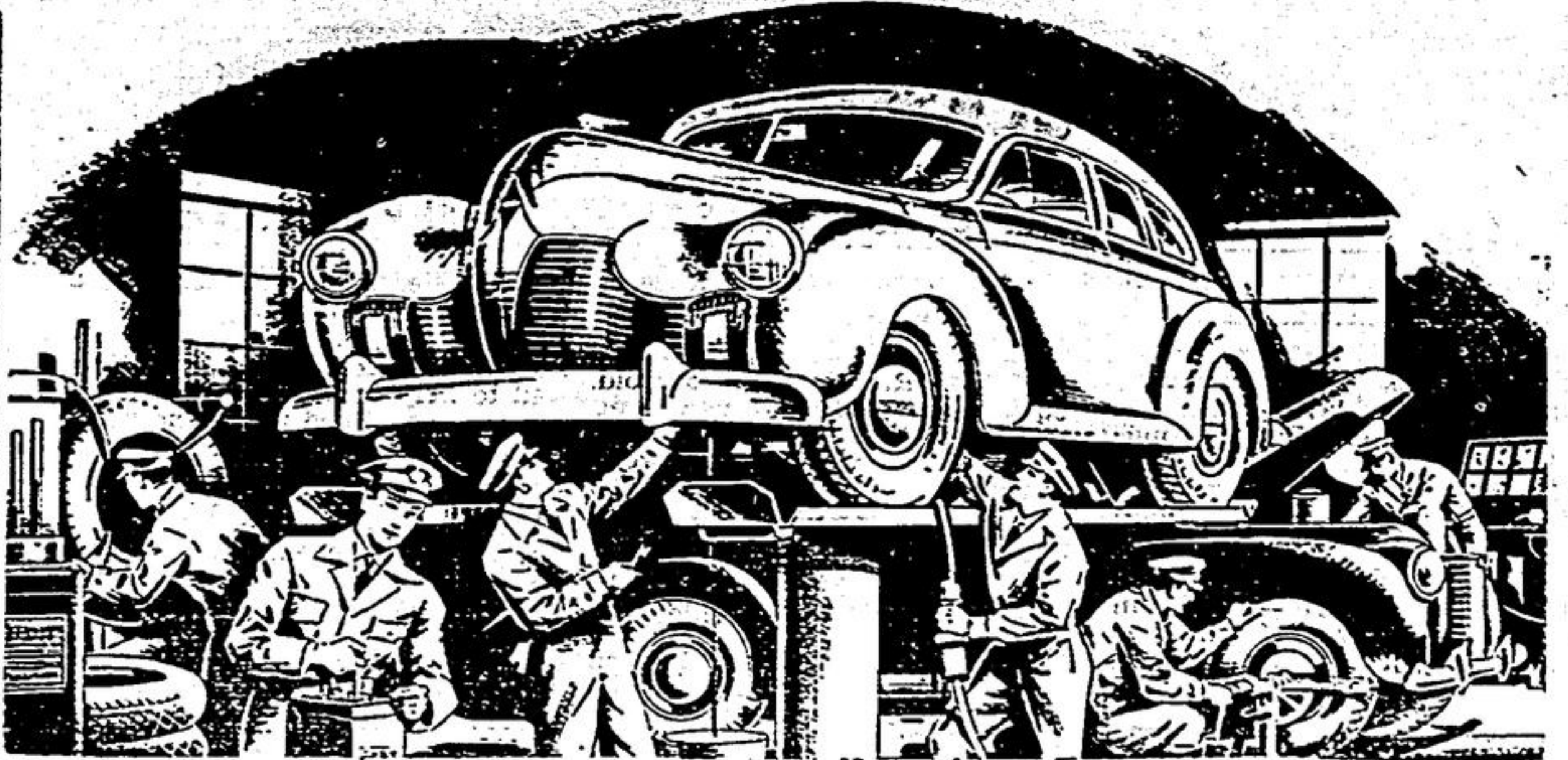
At last, the baseball team won a game, on Friday night when they played Dunbarton on their home grounds. This might mean better luck.
