## Donald Beaton Passes in Whitevale



Pickering Township Clerk, with the longest active record in the province, Donald Beaton, passed away, at his home in Whitevale, early Saturday evening, July 13th. Although in failing health for several years, he had not been forced to bed until the last three weeks.

Donald Beaton was municipal clerk of Pickering for sixty-one years, and together with his father before him, Hector Beaton served the municipality for the longest span of any known officials in Ontario.

The late Mr. Beaton was in his 86th year, and since retiring from the position as active clerk several years ago, has continued to sit at the council board in an advisory capacity.

His wife, the former Ida Cooper, predeceased him twelve years ago. To the union were born three children, two sons, William Beaton, K.C., of Toronto, and Dr. B. Beaton of Whitby, and one daughter, Mrs. Howard Turner, Whitevale. There are eleven grand children and six great grandchildren.

The name of Donald R. Beaton is probably more familiar than any other in the Township of Pickering, and like his father before him, his outstanding characteristics were his honesty and thoroughness, with a sense of duty second to none. To all who knew him, or came within the influence of his personality, he was a Christian gentleman.

The funeral on Tuesday afternoon was under Masonic auspices, and was conducted by Rev. John McLachlan assisted by Rev. J. D. Parks of Toronto. Pallbearers were E. L. Chapman, Robt. Reesor, R. E. Mowbray, John Forgie, Adam Spears, and D. B. Annis; honorary pallbearers, Wm. Reesor, G. M. Forsyth and W. G. Scott. Interment was made in Whitevale Cemetery.

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## M.O.H. Review Work Done in Pickering Twp.

Grade one, eight and twelve public schools throughout the Township of Pickering have all been covered by the physical examination of N. Tomlinson medical officer of health has advised Pickering township council. The policy of the Department, he says, is to urge the completion of the physical examination by the family physician and dentist, and if this is not done by the end of the school year, the Medical Officer of Health will undertake to do it.

The magnitude of the physical examination recently completed is indicated in the fact that the total enrolment of children in these grades numbers 235. The family physician examined 91 and the M.O.H. 125 of this total.

The report of the M.O.H. further indicates:

This year pre-school examination by the Medical Officer of Health has been instituted, the plan provides a physical examination for children starting school next September. By examining the children before they start their school career, physical defects can be corrected in time to prevent ailments and thus prevent absenteeism.

The Medical Officer of Health 67 pre-school children. Total examined by M.O.H. 192. Parents present 72.

Defects found by M.O.H. in group examined:

- Total number of children with defects: 28.
- Eye defect—strabismus 2
- Ear defect, acute ear infection 1
- Tonsil defect 10
- Speech defect 2
- Orthopedic 4
- Malnutrition 3
- Cardiac 5
- Nervous disorder 1
- Enlarged thyroid 1
- Postural defect 3
- Mentality 1

The M.O.H. completed immunization against Scarlet Fever by request, at one school, of 17 children including infant and pre-school children.

## Priority Users to Get Part of Tomato Output

Canners of tomatoes and tomato juice will be required to hold a part of their 1946 pack for essential purposes according to a recent announcement of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

Since July 2 tomato and tomato juice canners whose 1945 pack amounted to more than 10,000 cases of tomatoes, or more than 20,000 cases of tomato juice, must retain 15 percent of their total 1946 pack of canned tomatoes and canned tomato juice for allocation by the Board to priority users.
