WAGE CONTROL BOARD COULD DO SOMETHING ABOUT THIS
 Our attention was called the other day to a peculiar phase of the price regulations under the War-time Prices and Trade Board. One carpenter in Markham, a first-class mechanic is working for 60c per hour, while still another carpenter in the same municipality is drawing \$2.23 per hour.

Carpenter No. 1 explains that he is not permitted to charge any more than 60c per hour, since that was the basic rate per hour that the law binds him to. Carpenter No. 2 happened to be working at a more lucrative job at the basic period, and is now able to reap a long benefit.

If the facts as related are true, something ought to be done. We could not prove our statement, but we are sure that we could name any number of carpenters who have raised the per hour rate for their service over the basic period in 1942.

No appeal, we understand, has ever been made to the control board consequently the injustice continues on.

Nearly 200 Western Helpers in York
 This week will see the completion of the movement of farm help from the west to the farms of York county. Two months ago, W. M. Cockburn, agriculture representative for York county, asked the national employment service for 100 western harvesters, nearly double the number placed in York county last year.

Monday, Mr. Cockburn said that the 100-mark had been passed and practically all the applications for extra help filled. "Unfortunately, some farmers did not make application for help in time to have arrangements made to bring the required number east and as a result many were disappointed," said Mr. Cockburn.

The men were placed on farms the day they arrived by either Mr. Cockburn or one of his staff. No pool for last minute applicants was maintained.

W.P.T.B. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q.—Are laundries allowed to increase their prices? The laundry I have dealt with for years has raised the rate on our laundry from six cents per pound flat work to eight cents.

A.—As you gave us the name of the laundry we have checked their prices and find they were given permission by the Services Administration of the Board to increase the price for this particular type of work from six to eight cents a pound. Their prices were below those charged by other laundries for similar work and it was impossible for them to continue this service except at a considerable loss.

Q.—Would you please let me know when restrictions will be lifted so I can move into our own home by giving one month's notice to our tenants?

A.—There is no indication that the "freezing order" will be lifted in the near future. When the regulations are changed to permit persons to give tenants one month's notice to vacate you may be sure there will be ample notice given both in the press and over the radio.

Q.—My grocer has pork and beans and tomato ketchup for sale in his store but you cannot buy either one unless you buy a can of tomato soup and a can of vegetable soup at the same time. Is he allowed to do this?

A.—No. This is a conditional sale and such sales are illegal. The display of merchandise in a store in Ontario does not make it necessary for the storekeeper to sell. In other words he can refuse to sell these articles which are in limited supply, but he cannot ask a customer to buy something else in order to obtain any other product.

Q.—I have lived in this house for six years on a monthly basis. Today I have been advised the owner has sold the house to another man. Would you please advise how long I have to find another home or can they put me out? If a returned man happened to be wanting this house, would that make any difference in time allowed me to find another place?

A.—From your letter we cannot see that you can be given any notice to vacate from the old or the new owner. Under WPTB rentals regulations, tenants of self-contained accommodation are frozen as far as notice is concerned. If the new owner is a veteran and providing he bought the house or occupied it at the time of his enlistment, then he could give you three months notice to vacate. Otherwise a veteran-owner is on the same footing as a civilian owner. If you have any further questions about your position as a tenant, please call in at the nearest Rentals office. WIDENING YONGE STREET SOUTH OF RICHMOND HILL

Work commenced last week in removing the Yonge street bottleneck between Steele's Corners and Richmond Hill. A new lane ten feet wide is being added to the west side of the highway and later, when an

agreement can be reached with the municipalities regarding the radial railway right of way, a complete four-lane divided highway will be constructed. A snowfence is being used to divide the traffic from the workmen.
