**Phillips Estate Barn Burns with Loss of \$40,000**

Three Prize Ayrshire Calves Destroyed With Two Barns

Oriole, July 19.—Fire of an undetermined origin completely destroyed a large barn and stable on the estate of Col. W. E. Phillips on the Lansing cutoff east of here early Saturday morning. Damage has not been estimated but will likely be well over \$40,000 firemen said.

Firemen from North York and Agincourt fought the stubborn blaze for six hours in an effort to subdue the flames and at the same time protect three nearby barns, an elaborate milk-house and a cottage. At 9 a.m. smoke was still rising from the ruins of what was once one of the most modern equipped stables in the province.

Although numerous efforts were made to enter the stable and rescue three prize Ayrshire calves, tied inside firemen were unable to gain entry.

North York firemen under Deputy Chief William Ballantyne and Acting Captain Frank Bennett, received the alarm at 2 a.m. and raced five miles to the Oriole estate. Deputy Chief Ballantyne said that the glow was visible in the sky from a distance of four miles.

Arriving at the scene a short time after the alarm had been received North York firemen found both the barn and stable enveloped in flames. A help call was immediately sent out to the Agincourt Fire Department.

"The blaze had made so much progress when we arrived that we directed most of our attention to saving the buildings nearby," Deputy Chief Ballantyne told the Telegram. He said a total of 2,800 feet of hose was used in an effort to concentrate sufficient water on the buildings to bring the flames under control.

"It's hardly possible to extinguish a fire in a barn loaded with bales of hay as was the barn on Col. Phillips' estate," Ballantyne declared.

Col. Phillips, who was absent at the time of the outbreak of the fire, highly praised the efforts of the Agincourt telephone operator who, he said, "did a grand job when one of my employees told her of the fire."
