Born on the 4th concession of Uxbridge sixty-eight years ago, Chas. DeRusha passed away at the home of Mrs. Jas. DeRusha, Uxbridge on Sunday, July 21st. Deceased had been in failing health for nearly ten years.

The late Chas. DeRusha spent a

CAN MAKE SEARCH WITHOUT WARRANT

Officers of the Ontario Department of Lands, Forests and Fisheries have authority to search any vehicle, railway car, tourist camp, lumber or mining camp, without first going through the generally-recognized procedure of obtaining a search warrant.

Amendments to Ontario statutes, reaching official circles here today, include among other changes in the laws authority for officers of the department to make on-the-spot searches if they believe that any game might have been taken illegally.

Under the new regulations a game warden may make a search for illegally-taken game wherever and whenever he has reason to suspect that someone has been illegally engaged in taking game out of season, exceeding limits, or breaking any game laws.
