over to Robert doesn't say a word to him but twists his arm and marches him over to the car. Harold, if the defense is to be believed, was hit by a billy before he started to struggle. Isn't there some natural resentment in every human being at being handled like this?
SEE BLAME ON BOTH SIDES
"I say that if the police had used some diplomacy, a great deal of this would have been avoided," said Mr. Rose. "There's blame on both sides. Harold was hit with a billy time after time. He was unconscious as Constable (Keith) Hamilton has volunteered to tell us. The police, by their bad manners, incited the crowd to everything that was done that night. They lost control. Why should these 10 men be singled out and brought to court? Why not everyone else in the crowd?"
Seven of the accused took the stand in their own defense. The Arsenaults and Donald Buker declined to testify. Of those who did testify, however, none admitted putting sand in the York County police car's gas tank, removing its ignition wires or trying to tip it over. And none had been definitely identified as perpetrators of these acts with the exception of William Canjolousky, 20, who was named by a Crown witness as the man who took out the ignition wires.
Canjolousky denied this. He claimed that Mrs. Isabel Grounds, who identified him, had a "pretty fair grudge against me" because he had been rude to her two years ago. He said he didn't know anything about cars, but admitted working in a service station, dispensing gasoline and oil, for about four months.
William Trent, 25, denied stealing Constable Hamilton's revolver, as a Crown witness had testified. "I was just standing minding my own business when I got a slug in the mouth with something harder than a fist," said Trent. "Two of my teeth were smashed. I looked and thought it was Hamilton. So I walked over and told him what I thought of him."
ASSERTS BLOW "PROVOKED"
Carl Steckley, 21, admitted hitting Police Chief Fisher Dunham of Aurora, but said he was provoked by the sight of Dunham using a billy on his 18-year-old brother Douglas. (Dunham had testified he only used the billy on Carl, but "to good effect.") Douglas Steckley said he had been yelling at a policeman who was slugging Harold Arsenault on the head as he lay on the ground. He couldn't say which officer it was. Next thing he knew Dunham cracked him on the head, he said.

BAPTISM AT MUSSELMAN'S LAKE IN 1843

(continued from page 6)

and the subsequent month: "Dec. 4 — Attended fellowship meeting in Oshawa; had a good meeting; and next day preached and baptised three. On the 7th pursued my way to Haldimand, Preached twice on Sabbath; obtained 12 members for the Missionary Society and collected £1 2s 6d. Visited the church in Cranah. They have promised to make a donation in aid of the Mission. 18th—Preached near Port Credit in the forenoon and in the afternoon near Oakville. Spent a little time visiting the brethren and collected £2. On Christmas preached to the church in Waterloo, in company with Eld. F. B. Rolfe and had an excellent meeting. Here I succeeded in obtaining 20 members for the society. Jan. 4, 1854—Preached near Port Credit; and on the 5th made my way to Whitby again, after an absence of about three weeks. Found all well. Visited some of the brethren in Whitby on the 6th and 7th. On the 8th, which was Sunday, was sick at home, in consequence of taking cold, and over-doing. Went to Orono on the 12th to meet the Missionary Board. Had not a quorum and could do no business. Went to Pickering on the 14th; obtained 12 members; preached on Sunday the 15th; and on the 16th returned to Whitby. Spent Sunday, 22nd, in Newmarket, 29th in Oshawa and Feb. 5th in Whit-church. 12th spent with the church in Clarke. Went to Gwillimbury on the 16th and spent eight days visiting East and North Gwillimbury and King. At Ottawa on the 25th, March 6th at Scarborough; found things low but did a little and promised to visit them again."

Travelled Over 1,300 Miles
While giving up the duties of pastor of the Oshawa church in 1856, he continued vigorously in the work throughout the conference and as late as 1871 wrote: "I have finished my winter's campaign of over 1,300 miles travel, partly by my own and partly by public conveyance. On the 5th of February I was visiting a dear sister residing in Jeddo, Michigan. In the forenoon of that day I preached there; and in the evening, by Elder H. Hayward's request I spoke to his congregation near Farewell's Mills. At both of these meetings were present a large number of persons formerly with Canada; several of whom I had baptised. On Monday morning I bade farewell to my brethren in Romeo, expecting to meet them no more until we reach the promised land. From here Elder D. W. Moore accompanied me to the Grand Trunk Railway Station at Ridgeway, where we parted. Brother Moore going West and I East. I reached home on the 14th and found that Elder Childs of the State of New York had been at Oshawa and preached two or three sermons to good acceptance and gone to Orono in company with Elder Fowler to hold a general meeting there. I made my way to Orono where I had the pleasure of listening to two sermons from him, which will not soon be forgotten.
"On the 24th I went to Brougham and visited some friends there and next day reached Bloomington in time for their fellowship meeting. Here I found Elder Tatton engaged in a good work. He has lately baptised 28 and received 30 into church fellowship. The next day I preached for him in that place and in the evening at Ringwood. Some interest is awakened in that place too. Four have made a start for heaven. The next day I was conveyed by my grandson, a distance of 15 miles in Drayton, in good time for their fellowship meeting. Here I met my brother, Elder William Henry, who has charge of that district. We had a good time. The next day I preached to a full house. On Monday the 6th, my brother William took me to Minto; here I remained three days visiting friends and resting."
Called to Reward in 1879
Mr. Henry took ill in 1878 and although continuing in poor health he went to Orono, in September 1879, to attend Conference, an event which he had never missed during his many years association with the church. While at Orono, however, he became seriously ill and a few days later passed to his reward, being buried on the little hill by the lakeshore, not more than a half mile from his home on September 23, 1879.
