THE PASSING OF MR. J. S. HOLMES

His father, James Holmes was born in Beckfoot, Cumberland, England and came to Richmond Hill in 1857. Soon after, he settled at Thornhill carrying on the business of carriage-making. Three years later he married Miss Matilda Mar-

tin, third daughter of Capt. Joseph Martin of Markham township. After living at Thornhill for three years he moved to the 4th con. of Markham, on a farm north of Buttonville, now owned by the Calverts where they remained for fifteen years. To them were born ten children, eight boys and two girls, namely, Parker, Elwood, Isaac, Henry, Robert, David, John Sterling, Walter, Emma and Sarah. While some of the family were quite young they moved to St. Vincent township near the town of Meaford. Though one hundred miles divided them, they have always kept in touch with their old schoolmates — the Lundy's and Nichols', and prior to coming to

Stouffville the late John S. would spend several of the summer months each year around Victoria Square. He was the last survivor of this large family. In religion he was a faithful member of the United Church. In his earlier life he attended Sunday School continuously for seven years without missing one single Sunday.
The funeral service took place at the home on Saturday evening, August 3rd, conducted by Rev. E. Morton. Mr. Carl Boardway rendered a solo in his usual pleasing manner, accompanied by Mrs. Charles Nolan at the piano. Interment took place in Lakeview cemetery, Meaford on Monday.
