Impressive final tribute was paid to the memory of an old Uxbridge resident of bygone days, Joseph A. Halpanny when many former residents and friends attended his funeral service in Ottawa last week. Mr. Halpanny who was a native of Ottawa died in that city in his 82nd year.

Years ago Joe Halpanny was one of the "old boys" of Uxbridge in the days of Archie Weeks' great choir, and George McGuire's prize-winning band, when Uxbridge was a noted musical centre. He was employed with the Organ Co. and had a good voice and splendid stage presence, old timers recall. Joe was always in demand at local concerts, and had entertained in Stouffville on some occasions. One of his old friends told The Tribune, "the house was always with him in a big way when he gave his favorite. I'm the man that Broke the Bank at Monte Carlo."

HAIL DAMAGE SMASHES MANY FARM HOUSE WINDOWS

Most severe damage in the district between Uxbridge and Port Perry in last Sunday's storm was reported at Ensom, where hail stones the size of golf balls lashed crops and broke dozens of windows within a radius of about one mile.

At the farmhouse, of Drew McCullough 19 windows were smashed, the hail in some cases driving through both storm window and regular panes to cut the blinds. Ralph Wideman also reported windows broken in his house. Throughout the area corn was cut down, the tops of potatoes lashed and the grain threshed out of the shocks in the fields.

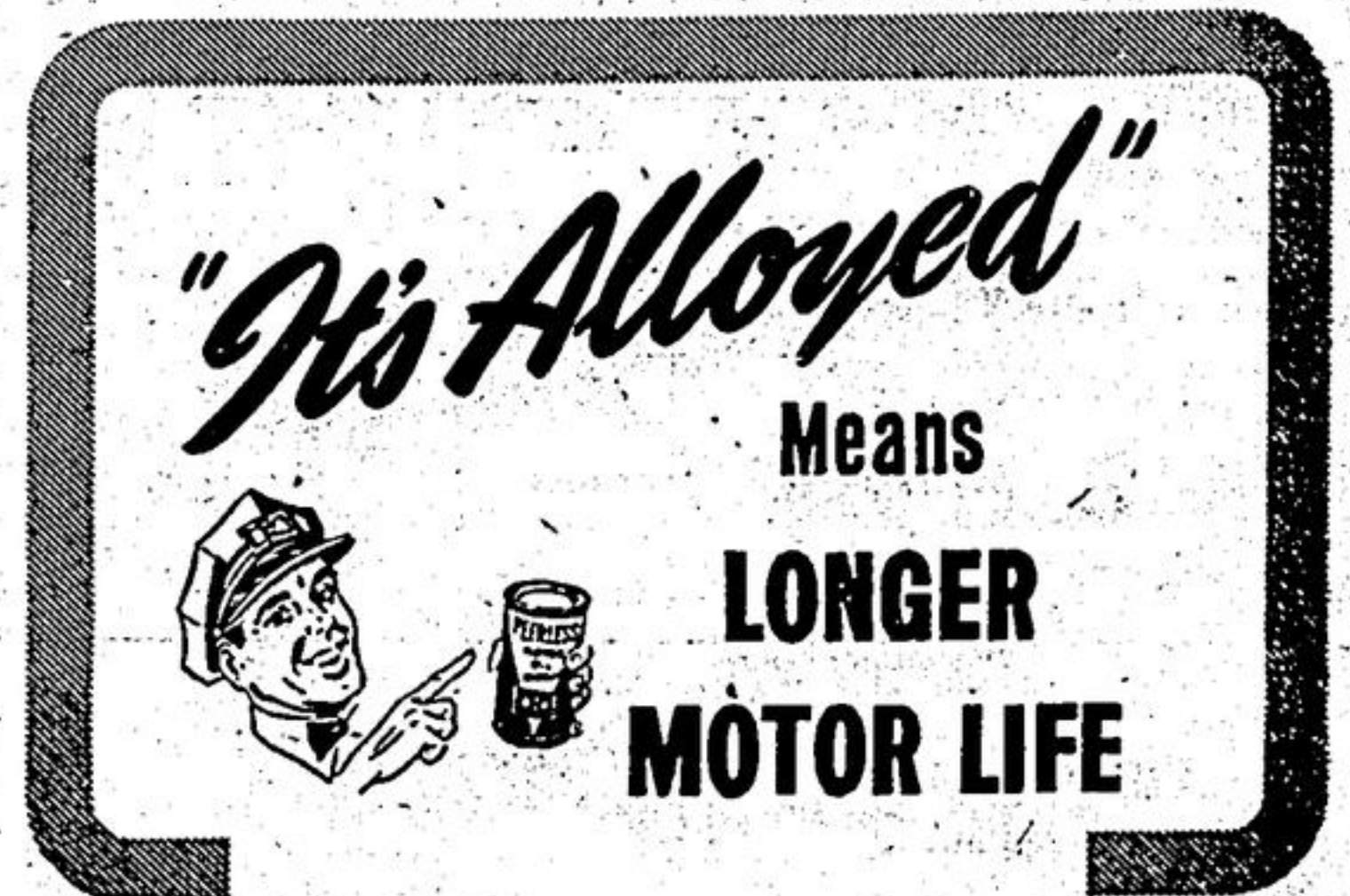
