The body of Harry Murphy, 23 their home in Greenwood for the last was recovered Wednesday afternoon last week about 3 p.m.

The drag which had been in use in searching for the body caught on a stump, and a truck was called to Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Annis also help pull it loose. The agitation which was set up is believed to have dislodged the body, for it floated free to the surface in 30-35 feet of water.
