## Claremont Take Softball Title for Second Year

Down Dunbarton 8-3 in Thrilling Third Game Played Before Nearly 600 Spectators

Claremont came through in the third and deciding game of their playoff round with Dunbarton, defeating them 8-3 on the Pickering diamond Saturday night, before the largest crowd of the season, estimated to number about 600 fans.

Claremont were never headed in game at any time, and Bob Miller on the local mound was in superb form, striking out fourteen batters, three of them in succession on two occasions. Frank Stroud was on the hill for Dunbarton.

Grant Johnson, lanky first base banded out a home run with one aboard in the 5th innings, the ball being hard hit on a line just inside the first base line.

The championship trophy was presented to Claremont immediately following the game. This is their second straight championship.

In the second game played at Claremont on Thursday night, the blues downed the local red and white by the narrow margin of 3-2. It was a dingdong battle all the way with the boys from No. 2 having a slight edge. Roy Howes for the south hit a homer with nobody on in the fourth innings. Ken Ward was in to pitch hit in the final innings, but Dunbarton held Claremont off to keep the series alive and force the third and deciding game.

## Girl Struck by Car Driver Charged

An eight-year-old girl is in the Sick Children's Hospital in Toronto now after being hit by a car on Thursday night, and the driver of the car is charged with being intoxicated while in charge of a car and with dangerous driving.

The girl is Helen Sutherland, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Sutherland, of Claremont, and she was struck down by a car driven by John Blair, of Brooklin, as she was walking across the Main St. near her home. The accident happened at approximately 10 o'clock Thursday night, when the driver apparently failed to see the little girl in the path of his car.

After being attended to by Dr. N. F. Tomlinson, of Claremont, Helen was rushed to the Toronto hospital. She has a badly broken thigh and suffered head injuries and shock. Police say that her condition is not regarded as serious but that the broken leg will take many weeks to heal, as the break is near the hip and will need special treatment. Weights will have to be used on the leg for some weeks before it can be set.

Helen is one of seven children in the Sutherland family, and Mr. Sutherland, operates a butcher shop in Claremont.

The accident was investigated by Constable Jack Norton, of Claremont, and Provincial Constable Harold Quatrill of the Whiteby detachment, and Blair, who stopped his car at the scene of the accident, was arrested and taken to the County Jail. He was charged by P.C. Quatrill with dangerous driving and with being intoxicated while in charge of a car, and was released on bail of \$1,000.

## Find Drowned Lad After 25 Days

The body of Harry Murphy, 23 year old R.C.A.F. veteran, who was drowned in Chalk Lake while on a swimming party there on July 27 last was recovered Wednesday afternoon last week about 3 p.m. The drag which had been in use in searching for the body caught on a stump, and a truck was called to help pull it loose. The agitation which was set up is believed to have dislodged the body, for it floated free to the surface in 30-35 feet of water.

Prov. Constable Maguire and Quatrill had been dragging the lake ever since the accident, and when their efforts were unsuccessful the R.C.A.F. sent an eight-man squad, composed of deep water grappling specialists from the R.C.A.F. marine section in Trenton to their assistance.

The parents of the dead veteran, Mr. and Mrs. Murphy, were on their way from their home in Saskatchewan to visit their son at the Toronto Rehab. School when the drowning occurred. They refused to leave for the West before their son's body was recovered.

The body has been taken to Toronto, according to Dr. F. A. Cuddy, Whiteby coroner, who was called to Chalk Lake about 4.30 Wednesday afternoon. No inquest will be held.
