Natural Gas To Serve the District

One of the most sensational announcements to come to the attention of the Richmond Hill district in quite some time was made before the Vaughan township council says the Richmond Hill Liberal, when two representatives of Imperial Oil addressed the gathering.
The announcement means in effect—

That the area within a radius of 75 miles of the village of Maple (which would include Stouffville) will by next year have natural gas, all the natural gas the residents may require for cooking, heating and any other purpose to which they may wish to put it.
Although called natural gas, the new product is not the gas that comes from underground sources, and used and referred to in many parts of Canada as natural gas. The fuel is liquid and is, therefore, sometimes referred to as "bottled gas." This liquid vaporizes on coming in contact with air, somewhat as gasoline and air put through a carburetor are converted into the vapor fuel for an automobile.
The fuel comes in cylinders that are inserted in a tank located outside the house of the consumer. From this tank it is piped into the house much as the Consumers' Gas Co. of Toronto pipes its product

from mains along the street. The new fuel passes through a meter on entering the house, and the house-keeper is billed only for the quantity registered on his meter.
The company maintains a record of about how much a given householder uses in a certain period of time, probably a week or a month, and before a cylinder is exhausted it is replaced by a new one.
R. J. Hickey, for the company, stated that Imperial Oil intends to build a tank 65 feet long by 7 feet in diameter in the immediate vicinity of the Maple station, to convey the gas thereto by train and to establish a distribution system within the 75 mile area as speedily as possible.
It would be putting it mildly to say that members of the Vaughan council were surprised, and it would have been only natural, following the announcement, to expect that a request would be made for tax exemption, a site as a gift or some such concession, but no request of any kind was even hinted.
"Our plans," said Mr. Hickey, "have been approved by the Railway board and the fire underwriters, and our rates for gas will be the same as those existing elsewhere in the province and will be measured to the consumer by meter. We hope to make the plant a credit to the municipality, and we will employ from 15 to 20 Maple people. Natural gas is supplied to many communities in the United States as we propose to dispose of it here, and these enterprises are quite successful. There is no objectionable odour to the gas, and there will be nothing unpleasant about the plant."

NEW TYPE BRIDGE ON NEW HIGHWAY
Work Going According to Schedule in Oshawa-Whitby Section
Work on the two lane highway between Whitby and Oshawa is proceeding according to schedule, was the report received from the Brennan Construction Company. One side of the south lane is completed and the second section will be finished within a week.
The north lane is being readied for the concrete work, which will commence very shortly, although the company do not expect that this section will be finished before freezing weather stops the work. It is hoped, however, that Oshawa people, travelling to Whitby will have the use of the south lane during the winter months.
Employ 220 Men
Work will stop with the arrival of the first heavy frost, and the cessation of operation will release approximately 220 Whitby and Oshawa men until the resumption of work in the spring. The company hope that this will not take place until well into October, but they are entirely controlled by the vagaries of the weather.
Work is well under way on the cloverleaf bridge at the Thickson sideroad. This bridge differs from those already placed, and is an improvement over the older type, developed during the war years. It is a single span bridge, of 115 feet, pleasing simple in design and has the advantage of having no centre supports to obstruct the vision of drivers. It is the first of its kind to be erected in Canada and will be one of six on the stretch of road between West Hill and Oshawa.

EARLY SETTLER DIES CAME HERE IN 1864
ASHBURN, Sept. 7—Mrs. Elizabeth Taylor, widow of the late William Taylor, died at her residence, Ashburn, near Oshawa, yesterday, in her 92nd year.
Born in County Durham, England, she came to Canada when a

child of nine years of age. She was the daughter of the late Isabella Tait and John Hall of Durham, England. Mrs. Taylor celebrated her 91st birthday anniversary on June 10 last.
She is survived by three daughters and six sons: Mrs. Wesley Slack of Brougham, Mrs. Walter Lydne of Myrtle Station, and Mrs. Bert Duff of Myrtle P.O.; and George H. Taylor of Stouffville, Tobe Taylor of Creelman, Saskatchewan; James and Jacob of Claremont; Russel of Myrtle Station, and Charles of Whitby. Six of Mrs. Taylor's sons predeceased her.
She is survived also by 43 grandchildren and 28 great-grandchildren

She was a lifelong member of Ashburn Presbyterian Church and the funeral will be held in Ashburn Presbyterian Church on Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.
