## THE MIXING-BOWL

Hello Homemakers! Bless them all. I mean the fine array of vegetables—the long and the short and them all. Unless our I.Q. is definitely under par there are more interesting ways to serve vegetable plates than any other group of main dishes. A plate consisting of boiled vegetables is uninteresting—bake one vegetable, steam another and scallop the third. And to make a vegetable plate substantial use two root vegetables and a green leafy one. Garnish plain, uniform sized vegetables with parsley, chopped egg, grated cheese, croutons or herbs.

Try These Combinations  
Cauliflower with mock Hollandaise sauce, broiled tomatoes, buttered peas.

Chopped spinach, carrot balls, baked onions stuffed with buttered and seasoned crumbs.

Corin-on-cob, glazed sweet potato, buttered string beans.

Baked stuffed peppers (with barley), grilled eggplant, buttered beans, coleslaw with Russian dressing.

Baked tomato with grated cheese, mushrooms, lima beans.

Baked onions stuffed with carrots, broccoli, baked potato on half shell.

Mashed summer squash, chopped and seasoned beet tops, golden bantam corn, sweet potato croquettes.

Fried macedoine of tomatoes, onions, cucumbers and green peppers; creamed wax beans.

Green peas, turnip greens and creamed radishes.

**FRIED MACEDOINE**

4 tomatoes, 2 cucumbers, 2 green peppers, 1 large onion, sliced, 3 tbsps. shortening, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce, few grains pepper.

Wash, peel, and slice tomatoes and cucumbers. Remove seeds from green peppers and cut in small pieces. Fry onion in shortening until slightly browned. Add tomatoes, cucumbers, green peppers, salt, pepper, and Worcestershire. Stir together lightly and fry slowly until cooked.

**GREEN PEAS AND MUSHROOMS**

½ lb. mushrooms, 1 lb. shelled peas, 4 tbsps. shortening, ¼ cup water, 1 tsp. salt, few grains pepper.

Wash and cut mushrooms in pieces. Melt shortening and saute mushrooms. Add peas, water and seasoning. Cover and cook 20 mins.

**STEAMED CARROTS AND CELERY**

3 tbsps. shortening, 4 carrots, 1 cup celery cut in pieces, ½ tsp. sugar, 1 small onion, sliced, few grains pepper, ¼ cup water, ¼ tsp. salt.

Melt shortening, add onion and brown slightly, wash, scrape and slice carrots. Add carrots, celery, salt, pepper, water and sugar to the onions and butter. Cover tightly and steam until tender. When done all the water should be evaporated.

**THE SUGGESTION BOX**

1. For fresh flavour, add your own garden herbs to canned soup.

2. Use lemon to bring out flavour. Rub chicken with cut lemon before cooking. Squeeze lemon over steak before serving.

3. Save lemon rinds and fill with tartar sauce; they make an attractive garnish for fish platter.

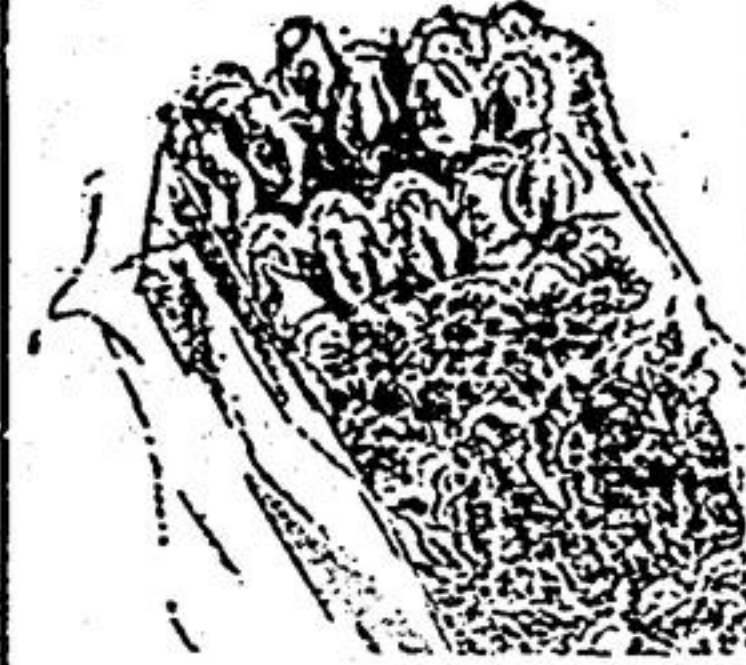
4. Add some red colouring to the syrup for canned pears and some green colouring to another batch of syrup. They make attractive festive salad plates.

5. Keep salt free-running by adding some pieces of laundry starch or pot barley to the shaker.

Be sure that lead pipes are drained of water before painting; otherwise a sweating pipe is likely to ruin the paint job.

## Gormley Man Accompanies Monty To Winnipeg

Godfather to Grandson of Col. S.C. Snively of Wilcox Lake at Oak Ridges Ceremony.

Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery was godfather for Margaret Ann Warren, two months old daughter of Lt. Col. Turnbull Warren, at a christening service held in St. John's Church at Oak Ridges on Yonge street on Sunday afternoon, Sept. 8.

Col. Warren, the eldest son of Mrs. S. C. Snively, served overseas with the 48th Highlanders and was appointed Canadian representative on Field Marshal Montgomery's staff.

Some time ago Montgomery intimated that he would like to be godfather to the baby, and both the Field Marshal and the child's parents were delighted when his visit to Canada came at an appropriate time for the event.

Rev. J. A. Worrell, rector of the parish, officiated at the service which was attended by the immediate relatives. The guests were afterwards entertained at "Glenlonely" the country home of Col. and Mrs. S. C. Snively, grandparents of the baby.

Col. Snively accompanied Montgomery by plane to Winnipeg where he attended the General Synod of the Anglican Church as a layman.

When a plane alighted on Wilcox Lake that Sunday afternoon rumors spread swiftly that it was the Field Marshal since some people were hazily aware that he was expected at the Snively farm that day. However, the plane proved to be in charge of some people from King township, and the incident passed off without further adieu. In fact the crowd accepted the disappointment of not seeing the eminent personage as proving his coming at all was just a false rumor, and went away.

When the guests and Field Marshal did arrive at Glen Lonely it was quite unofficial and was not realized by the public.

## SELDOM SEEN

With all this mechanization going on, almost anything might be seen in the future—anything but the automatic hen.

Mechanization has gone to such extremes now that on some big poultry farms, poultry has been relegated to the position of a machine. Except when the eggs are collected, the fowls hardly get a glimpse of a human being. Mechanization there includes automatic waterers and feed carriers—but the one thing it can never include is the human touch, and no machine has yet been built that knows the art of poultry husbandry.

Speaking of new fangled things—a lot of plastic materials came from farm products, and it looks as though livestock knows a farm product when it sees it, because plastic gadgets which have been left within reach of goats and cows have been eaten by them.

I was speaking with some neighbors about mechanization and such, and after a while the conversation became flighty; it flowed into imaginative channels; it got completely out of control and strayed far from practical matters. One of the neighbors said he wished there was a machine that could control the weather. While we were on the subject of weather, someone said that we farmers could predict the following day's weather more accurately than the people at the weather bureau—and what did that say for science? Then the conversation returned to imaginary things. For instance we incubate chicks, so why not babies. Our farm women are very busy and they would see a great time-saver in this innovation. Then someone said, what was the use of saving time. The faster we go, the less time we have, and isn't that just true. How many years did we drive the old gray to Stouffville, starting early in the morning and getting back after market around 3 or 4 o'clock. Now we go there in 15 minutes, but what time has been saved. Certainly we are more rushed than ever, so what is the answer. This ability to go places has made too many dissatisfied with staying at home, consequently most people run so much, they haven't time for anything else, and there you have it.
