worst slaughters of the war occurred, a ferry terminal, which the Germans had bombed while it was crowded with thousands of people, horses and luggage. Much of the debris, including the dead horses still remain. One of the churches visited, had been built in 1417, and another, a Mennonite church, had a badly battered roof. When we reached the cobbler's home, he invited us in, and we finally went inside with some misgivings. We'd hardly got inside, when the stranger's wife hurried around and locked the door. The people are afraid of the Russians, and there were quite a few Russian soldiers to be seen on the streets. The man showed us pictures of his family, and then let us out," said Mr. Nighswander.

"The people are very suspicious of everyone else, and although we inquired what the shooting was that was heard nightly from our ship, no one would ever admit that they knew."

As in all war-torn countries, the children appeared the most destitute, and would beg for food or anything else you had a mind to give them. If you gave one child anything, you soon had a crowd following you. Most of them were German orphans, whose parents had been either killed or driven out when the Russians came. Many wore cast off army clothes, and displayed sores and signs of malnutrition.

Busses were operating to and from the centre of the city, but the rolling stock was not up to much, having bullet-riddled tops and sides. Women could be seen here and there clearing rubble from shattered buildings, by bucket line, the only apparent means, and without bulldozers and powerful machinery, the clearing of the city looked like an endless job, Mr. Nighswander thought.

"We went ashore at Keil for a short time on the return trip, and this German centre appeared in much better state of repair than the Polish centre. The people too, seemed better fed."

The return crossing of the Atlantic was made without incident. The ship came back empty, which seemed strange owing to the reports of a shipping shortage on every hand. The three local men were exactly seven weeks from the time they left their home farms until they returned.
