

About Cauliflower

The Kitchener News-Record reports a customer on the market in that city being able to purchase a cauliflower weighing 15 pounds for only 15 cents. This kind of vegetable has been very plentiful this season, in fact they came so fast that the market was glutted. Unlike turnips, carrots, and other vegetables the cauliflower cannot be cut until ripe, and no mistake about it, otherwise it will not be fit to use. They cannot readily be stored either, and thus they are difficult to handle.

Beautiful big heads are obtainable in Stouffville at 10c. and 15c. each. No finer cauliflower are grown anywhere than those produced around this district. Eight cents a head to the grower, an acre would realize, on the basis of 5,000 head to the acre, \$400. However, wages are high and fertilizers cost a lot of money, so that such a return would be quite inadequate.

Parents Forced to Take Baby Bonus or Sutter Tax Loss

Persons with children under 16 years who now are not receiving family allowances should make immediate application to meet income tax revisions effective Jan. 1, the health department said today.

Those in Stouffville, who have steadily refused this government bonus, will now have to revise their ideas, or pay the penalty.

Under income tax revisions made in the budget last June and effective with the 1947 tax it is assumed that all taxpayers with children under 16 receive the allowances and the exemption for each child is fixed at \$100.

Previously, taxpayers who were in higher tax brackets and whose allowances would have been entirely offset by tax could either collect the allowances and repay them or not take allowances. Under the existing arrangement small families with incomes of not more than \$3,200 receive no benefit from children's allowances.

The department said in today's statement that a number of families receiving less than \$3,200 had not taken the benefits because the amount they retained would be negligible.

"This will no longer be the case," the department said. "Beginning in 1947 the taxpayer will be allowed a straight \$100 exemption from taxable income for each child under 16 years of age and may also receive the full family allowance, if registration is made before January."

Those affected by the change were urged to obtain forms from a post office and make immediate application.

Payment of allowances starts one month after registration is made and payments are not retroactive.

LONG TRIAL LIKELY IN JOHN DICK CASE

Three to Face Hamilton Court on Monday on Charge of Murder

A large list of prospective jurors has been lined up by Sheriff A. C. Caldwell for the John Dick murder case trial of which begins in the Court House Monday at the opening of the Fall Assizes of the Supreme Court. Dick, it will be recalled, was employed around Cedar Grove when he came from Russia as an emigrant.

Each of the accused, Mrs. Evelyn Dick, 26; her father, Donald MacLean, and Mrs. Dick's friend, William Bohozuk, has the right to 20 challenges of the jurymen, and it is therefore expected that it will be late in the day before a jury is selected and evidence is heard by Mr. Justice F. H. Barlow and the petit jury.

It is generally believed that the trial will last at least four weeks, in view of the large number of witnesses—more than 100—being presented by the Crown. The trio is charged with the murder of John Dick, husband of Mrs. Evelyn Dick, whose headless, armless and legless body was found on Hamilton Mountain in March.

W.P.T.B. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q.—Is there a ceiling price on cold meats? I was charged 40c a lb. for Dutch Loaf at one store and next door the price was 29c. I went back and asked if they had made a mistake and the man said "No, if somebody else has a cheaper price why don't you buy there."

A.—There certainly is a ceiling price on cold meats. However, 40c a lb. was not over the ceiling price for Dutch Loaf. The other store may not have had the same grade of meat. There are many different grades and brands of meat of this type. As the 40c price was not over the ceiling there is nothing we can do about the difference in price. If you feel the 29c meat is just as good we suggest that you make future purchases at the store selling at this price.

Q.—A friend of mine rents an upper duplex. A week ago the landlord raised the rent \$5 a month. This was done without permission from the WPTB. My friend does not want to report the landlord as he is afraid he will be given notice to vacate as soon as the restrictions are lifted and he has a family and no place to go. Is there anything to be done in this case?

A.—You have sent us an anonymous letter without name of tenant, name of landlord or address so you can readily see we can do nothing for your friend. It would be impossible to send a rentals inspector out to call on every tenant in every upper duplex in the city to locate the one where the rent had been raised. The landlord can be prosecuted if you send us his name. We doubt if restrictions will be lifted until such times as there is more housing accommodation available so your friend should refuse to pay the extra rent.

Q.—Why is there a shortage of toilet paper when there seems to be plenty of cleansing tissues on the market also paper towels, fancy serviettes, etc.?

A.—Retailers had a fairly good supply of toilet paper until a story appeared stating that there was a shortage in one particular city. Then the greedy shoppers went to work and stores were stripped of all supplies within a day or two. It's the old story of one person having a cupboard full and another having none for that reason.

Q.—If a person is working for a company and living in a company house paying rent by the month can the company, after laying the man off, force him to vacate within 30 days? There was no contract when the house
