## Our Greatest Need Divulged in Church Anniversary Address

The anniversary services in St. James Presbyterian church last Sunday were well attended. The minister of the congregation Rev. Eric Larsen, conducted the services himself. In the morning Mr. Larsen had chosen his theme, "The Church, Yesterday and Today." Tracing the beginning of the Christian church in New Testament times he brought out that the church may be only a local organization, but may become members of the universal church. The ideal church, however, is that invisible church, the body of all believers who compose that church.

In the evening the theme was, "The Greatest Need of Stouffville," speaking about the growth of the church he mentioned the Reformation period and paid special tribute to the early reformers in Scotland. The need, however, is not a mere reformation of society, but the real need of Stouffville, or of any community, is a spiritual revival, a regeneration of the hearts of men and women.

At this latter service the ladies quartet from Markham sang "Transformed." The members of the quartet were Florence Hanna, Phyllis Hassal, Isabel Henderson and Molly Sinclair. A solo, "Precious Lord, take my Hand," also was sung by Mrs. J. J. Hanna. These musical selections were much appreciated by the congregation. Miss Nora Stanleton was at the organ for both services.

## Small Industries More Numerous

Stouffville is gathering around its borders numerous small industries, which to the opinion of many residents are much more valuable to the district, than one large industry. When the big plant shuts down, there is chaos, relief and hard times. With a series of small plants the possibility of them all closing at one time is remote.

In recent times the Gold Fish Supply Co. established itself in town, then came the Machine & Tool Works, and only this year the Home Manufacturing Co. These industries each employ around 20 to 25 hands.

In recent weeks another small plant is locating with us, namely the Stovel Co. buying, washing and waxing turnips, and shipping machinery is now being installed, and five men will be employed most of the year.

It is hoped that Percy Hewlett will be able to obtain machinery and building material for a modern laundry which will surely thrive here where such a business is needed badly.

All in all, Stouffville is gathering sufficient small plants that in the aggregate provide a good deal of employment of a very desirable nature. Not in many years has the town been so well off in the matter of being able to find work for the up and coming generation.
